Legislature Assembling.

The Oregon Legislature convenes at Salem next Monday, and those interested in the deliberations of that body are now all attention. There is undoubtedly a good deal of legislation that needs to be enacted for the well-being of the commonwealth, as Oregon is developing very fast, but while such is true there may be some contemplated that should not be enacted.

Every Legislature in whatever State must of necessity be watched, not often because of expected crookedness or dishonesty, for there is always a chance for serious blunders to be thoughtlessly made, and oftentimes such mistakes will be averted through the prompt and effective action of the people.

The message of Governor Chamberlain will be made public by Monday, and it will be anxiously read. No doubt it will contain many important recommendations for the consideration of our solons, as the Executive has said that he had much to communicate to the Legislature. There will be interest manifested in the Senatorial election to the extent, at least, of observing how well the members stayed with their promises respecting Statement No. 1. But Bourne very likely will be the choice, as he was by the people last June.

The Legislature now to assemble will be almost solidly Republican. Indeed, it is said that only one Democrat was elected from all Oregon to the lower house, and but two or three to the upper house, though the latter has a handful of hold-overs. And in the face of all this the people returned a Democratic Governor—because his record in office reflected ability and unquestioned honesty.

It is not always the best policy to give any political party absolute control of a body like this, but in the present instance, with a Democratic Executive, there is hardly perceptible danger from that source.

Coos county's delegation is made up of very fair men, so far as we can ascertain, and it is to be believed they will acquit themselves ably and approvedly during the legislative session.

Senator C. J. Smith of Pendleton will introduce a resolution in the Legislature having for its purpose the establishment of another insane asylum to be located at Pendleton, says a recent dispatch. The resolution will be a joint one, and will authorize the submission to a vote of the people of an amendment to the constitution providing for the location of State institutions in other parts of the State than Salem. If the resolution meets the favorable consideration of the Legislature the proposition will be voted upon at the next regular election which will be in June, 1908.

With three shipyards busily at work on contracts, with new mills building, and the probable resumption of bar improvement work, what

a spectacle of activity this section will present next summer. When the product of the Coquille country all goes to market by the route it should, namely Coquille bar, and admittedly it some day will, then Bandon will be the chief center of Superior Coos County. Our friends at the bay will no longer have Coquille's exports to put a respectable front to the commerce of Coos bay.

Delegate Dodge Files Brief.

The following brief was filed for the consideration of the River and Harbor Committee of the House of Representatives, Dec 21, 1906:

WASHINGTON, D. C.,

December 21, 1906.

Hon. T. E. BURTON, Chairman, Rivers and Harbors Appropriation Committee, U. S. Capitol.

DEAR SIR: I have the honor, as a representative of the people of Coquille Valley, Coos county, Oregon, to make a few brief statements why they petition Congress for an appropriation to improve their river and harbor navigation.

1. The lumber and manufacturing industry is increasing very rapidly in that section and would soon double the present output, if the project to improve the harbor was completed, and the shoals forming within the harbor and up the river were removed. As an addition of three large sawmills, a shipbuilding yard and other manufacturing plants are now planned to be erected on the lower river immediately.

2. Because of a tendency to shoaling and a change of the channel to the south near the entrance to the harbor, where there are large rocks endangering the passage of vessels, which retards the use of the excellent bar formed by the government jetties.

3. Because of there being several coal mines now opened, the shipping of coal is prevented owing to the difficulty of getting the same to market, and hundreds of men are being deprived of lucrative employment.

4. Because there are thousands of bushels of apples now decaying in the orchards, the result of the rail road tariff to Coos Bay and because of shoals inside the bar, vessels are often detained until the fruits decay after placing them on board the vessels.

5. Because the largest lumber manufacturing in the Coquille Valley are below Coquille City where the Coos Bay and Eastern Railroad enters that section of the country from Coos Bay. Therefore the handling of lumber and articles manufactured therefrom cannot be shipped with profit except by way of the mouth of the river, even if the railroad tariff was reduced to one-half its present rate.

The railroad from Coos Bay to Myrtle Point, which is situated at the confluence of the north and south branches of the Coquille river, is about twenty-eight miles long, and the freight on farm products is fully as much on the railroad as it is on an ocean steamer to San Francisco, a distance of over 300 miles.—Sentinel.

Returns from the ore taken to the city by Norman Dodge from their mine on Salmon mountain show that it runs 874 gold to the ton, not to mention the silver and copper, in which it was rich, but no allowance was made by the smelter for these metals. It is believed that the value per ton would have been doubled with all three minerals accounted for.—Enterprise.

One of the old Coos Bay Indians has passed to his happy hunting grounds. He was known as Chief Jackson, and was quite a character on the bay for the past fifty years. He made his home at North Bend for years, and was known by almost every one at that place.

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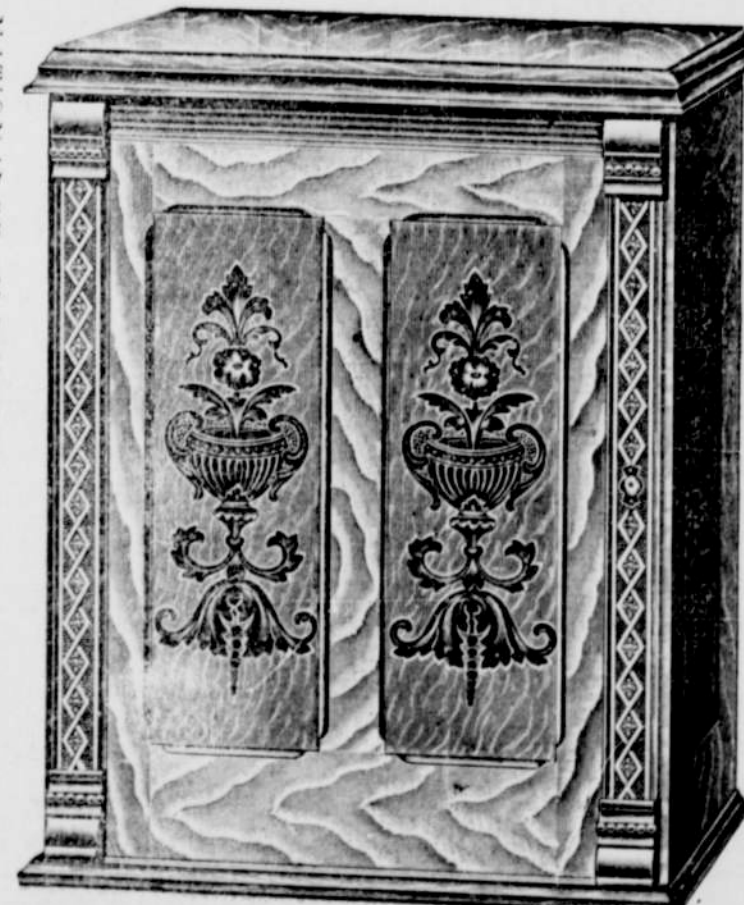
