The first speech in defense of the right of Reed Smoot to his seat in the Senate was delivered last Friday by Senator Hopkins of Illinois. Hopkins took the position that the Senators were not federal officers to the extent that the Senate could pass up on their qualifications and eligibility, or impeach them for high crimes and misdemeanors. He took the position that if a Senator was to be punished it must be done by the State or Federal courts. Only Federal officers, he maintained, were impeachable, and this impeachment must be for crime committed by such as Federal officers. The precedent cited was an unsuccessful attempt to impeach Senator Blount, of Tennessee, who was charged with treasonable correspondence with a foreign nation. The conclusion which Hopkins said had never been reversed, was that the Senate had no right to try the case, as Senator Blount was not an officer of the United States.

A telegram from Boise, Idaho, dated Jan. 11th, says that Representative Sewell, Democrat, offered a resolution in the house that day calling attention to the threatening language used by the President of the United States in which he declared his antagonism to the citizens of California on the Oriental school question; declaring the action of the citizens of California to be the result of ripe experience; noting that the President in his message to Congress insists upon the equality of the Caucasian and Japanese races so far as citizenship is concerned. The resolution concludes by expressing confidence in the people of California, and the belief that they are upholding the standard of American citizenship to the best of their ability, and urges that the Japanese be excluded from this country in the same manner as the Chinese are.

Osteopaths will ask the Oregon Legislature to enact a bill submitted to them to regulate the practice of their profession licensing practitioners. The examiners are to be five in number, appointed by the Governor, and each of them is to be a graduate of a legally authorized college of osteopathy. No person is to practice osteopathy without being licensed, after examination by the board in anatomy, physiology, chemistry, histology, pathology, gynecology, obstetrics and theory and practice of osteopathy, and such other branches as the board may deem advisable, or rather acceptance by the board of a diploma from a recognized school of osteopathy. The license fee is to be \$10. All practitioners are to submit to the law after March 1, 1907. They are not to be authorized to prescribe internal drugs nor perform major surgery.

Conrad Miller, a pioneer of Coos county, having located here in 1873, died at his home four miles south of Myrtle Point Friday, January 4th.

It is very evident that Oregon is in pressing need of adequate legislation for control of the railroads. The general cry which is going up throughout the entire West of a lack on the part of the railroads to move the freight from their warehouses, shows something wrong somewhere. Again it is noted that every candidate for either the position of Speaker of the House or President of the Senate is outspoken in favor of the creation of a Railway Commission and other legislation along these lines. The RECORDER, however, somewhat doubts that expected results of a Railway Commission will be fully realized judging from the manner in which California has fared with a body of this character. A Railway Commission is all right if it doesn't become the property of the railroads, which is too often the case in some states that have tried the experiment.

The Southern Pacific Railroad Company operates three sawmills of its own in the Willamette Valley. This is one way of relieving the car shortage for its patrons. A reciprocal demurrage law would not cause the company any great loss of sleep on shipments from its own mills.

Bandon's Low Tax.

County Clerk Watson has completed the work of making out the tax rate for Coos county for the ensuing year. An examination of the figures discloses that the city tax for Bandon will be but 5 mills on the dollar—one mill more than that of Marshfield and only one half the tax of Coquille or Myrtle Point. This is a most excellent showing for the growing little city by the sea.

Big Bonanza is Safe.

A dispatch from San Francisco dated Jan. 12th says: The bark Big Bonanza, which it was feared had foundered with all on board off the coast of Oregon, crept into port this afternoon under her own sail. The vessel had a very rough experience in the storm, but, beyond losing one of her sails and a small portion of her fore-castle being torn away, suffering no great damage. In the rough sea last Sunday Captain Cameron fell from the forward house and was badly injured. The tug Samson, which east the vessel adrift during the storm, has arrived in Portland, Oregon, in a battered condition.

Some of the strangest freaks of the forest were up toward the head of the stream where channel and valley are narrow. On Rock creek it is reported that several acres of alders, logs and poles accumulated in one place, and when the jam broke this mass of timber was whirled through a canon with a sound as of an army of large guns. When the timber got through much of it was split into kindling wood size. One who observed the sight said he saw two deer caught in the drift, and one of the animals was still alive as the drift passed. A herd of sheep took refuge on a knoll as thick as they could stand, and some of them were leg deep in water at that. Several of the animals were washed away and drowned.—Enterprise.
