The Oregon Legislature, having convened on the 14th instant at Salem and elected E. W. Haines of Washington county speaker of the Senate and Frank Davy of Marion county speaker of the House, is now busily turning at the wheel of legislation. Governor Chamberlain's message was an able and lengthy document, a copy of which has been kindly mailed to the Recorder. The Governor was for the second time inaugurated the day following the Legislature's convention. In his message he makes the following recommendations:

The creation of a Railroad Commission, to be appointed by the Governor; improvement of water ways and purchase of Oregon City locks; appropriation for maintenance of portage road; election of Bourne and Mulkey as United States Senators; income tax and increased tax on inheritance; flat salary for State Printer; one Board of Control of State Normal Schools; more equitable apportionment of representation in Legislature; anti-pass law; State to pay necessary traveling expenses of officials; State inspection of private banks; liberal appropriation for Seattle exposition; prohibition of lobbying, except under close restrictions; publicity of election expenditures; no corporation contributions; State supervision of private insane asylums; State asylum for feeble minded children; desert land and school land legislation.

The world is startled by another earthquake horror, and, as the disasters continue to occur in divers sections of the globe with the first in our neighboring State of California, we of Oregon shudder at the thought that our turn might be next. Providence has indeed dealt bitterly with some cities in the past twelve months. Jamaica is the latest to receive a shaking up, the calamity coming on Monday of last week, and it was one of the most frightful disasters of the year. It is said that 1,000 people are dead, and \$10,000,000 worth of property destroyed, and 90,000 persons rendered homeless. Kingston was almost completely destroyed, and fire swept through the ruins. Increased agitation is shown by Mount Vesuvius since the shock.

On account of the absence of several members of the city council of Klamath Falls, and the consequent inability of securing a quorum, no city tax levy was made within the time provided by law. A levy made afterward was refused by the clerk of Klamath county on account of its violating the general levy. The city has been making extensive expenditures of its general funds and is now bordering on the statutory limit of municipal indebtedness with a year to operate on with an empty treasury. From a reading of the council proceedings of that town the officials are carrying on to many large public expenditures out of their general fund.

## A Coos Bay View of Us.

The steam schooner Bandon, which is being constructed on the dock at Porter, will ply up and down the Coquille river carrying merchandise. This ship is also three months from the launching. It will have a capacity of 500,000 feet of lumber, and will approximate a cost of \$80,000. One hundred and twenty-five men are working at present on the skeletons of these future carriers of the coast's commerce.—Marsfield Times.

Well, really, we never thought Coos bay had so extravagant an opinion of the importance of Coquille-commerce! A ship to carry merchandise on the Coquille river, and having a carrying capacity of 500,000 feet of lumber at that. Go on, neighbor; we haven't quite reached the stage that requires so large a vessel to convey merchandise to the up-stream towns, but in another year, when four steamers instead of one are plying between Bandon and San Francisco, it is hard telling what may be the demands in that regard.

### Coquille Local Option.

The following clipping from the Salem Journal will prove of interest to the people of this section:  
The Coquille local option case was argued today before the Supreme Court. This is the instance where the whole of Coos went wet, and, while there was no voting in that precinct, Coquille went dry. In spite of that the city licensed saloons, and the question is, can a dry precinct be held to be prohibition when there was no petition to have an election in that precinct. Judge Burnett, in this county, was called to Coos county to try the case, and held the dryness of local option law was to be so construed that Coquille should stay dry. They took an appeal to the Supreme Court, and the funny thing about it is the wholesale liquor dealers' organization at Portland are not taking a hand, on the theory that they can sell more whiskey and case goods under local option than before, as it is easy of transportation. The Oregon brewers are of the opinion that the law kills the beer business.

General Funston has recommended that the pay of officers and men of the line in the United States army be raised, and in this connection has made a statement which is somewhat startling. He says that the common bod carrier is better paid than the soldier in the ranks of the United States army, and he expresses the fear that the soldiers will leave their duties and follow other vocations if they are not afforded better compensation for their services to the country.

Every divorce granted in the courts of Oregon during the past 20 years will be made the subject of investigation by a number of Government clerks who are headed for Portland, and will arrive during the present month, says the Salem Statesman. Records of the different suits for separation will be thoroughly scanned, and every interesting feature, sensational or otherwise, will be recorded and published in the reports of the department of Commerce and Labor, under which the investigations are being made. In this manner divorce cases which in years have set little tongues wagging and caused sensations in society, but have been forgotten, will be unearthed and given to the public.

That they are seeking only the same blessing which descended on the apostles who went forth to preach after the ascension of Jesus Christ, is the contention of the religious fanatics who are holding forth in Albany. The name "Tongues of Fire" comes from the eleven tongues of fire which appeared on the heads of the apostles as they tarried in an upper room as related in the Bible in verse 3 of chapter 2 of the Acts.


