Representative Chapin, of Multnomah county, states his position on the criticism which has been made that the reciprocal demurrage bill he has introduced is a political measure. He says: "I take issue with the contentions raised against the commission bill introduced by me and drawn by the transportation committee of the Chamber of Commerce of Portland. I find that practically all the opposition so far found to the measure arises from strictly party grounds. I discover from talk with those who have so far discussed the bill that the only objection found with it arises from the provision that Governor Chamberlain is given the appointive power in the creation of the commission after the enactment of the bill. The great fear is that it will be used as a means to increase Democratic patronage. It is said by the partisan press that the intent of the bill is political and that it has been drawn to this end, and I take exception to the statement. 'I am as good a Republican,' continued Mr. Chapin, 'as can be found in the Oregon Legislature. I take issue with the statement that the bill is a creation of J. N. Teal, builded in the interest of himself or of Governor Chamberlain. That cry has been raised in interested quarters to befog the issue, knowing the prejudice which a Republican Legislature would certainly have against any measure intended for Democratic gain. It is not a Democratic measure and is not intended for Democratic gain. It was not drawn by Mr. Teal in his interest or the interest of Governor Chamberlain or any patronage. The bill is not a creation of Mr. Teal but is a compilation of the Wisconsin and Iowa laws which have been operative for some time, and which was therefore valuable standards and foundations for the formation of the Oregon draft."

The long expected trial of Harry K. Thaw for the murder of Stanford White began in New York before Justice Fitzgerald last Thursday. The world has been told all the shocking details of this sensational crime, it is really to be hoped for the good of society that Thaw shares the fate of his victim.

With a few objecting voices, both houses of the Oregon Legislature, in special session, ratified the popular choice by electing Jonathan Bourne for the long term and Fred W. Mulkey for the short term to the United States Senate. The election of Fred W. Mulkey for the short term and Jonathan Bourne, Jr., for the long term was uneventful. There were no nominating speeches and no nominations. The clerk read the totals of the vote cast last June and the ballot following was of little interest save that the Democrats stood in to voice the will of the people for the opposing party.

The United States Senate last Thursday accepted a proposition of the House to increase the salaries of Senators, Members and Territorial delegates to \$7,500 annually, and those of the House and members of the President's cabinet to \$12,000. This action was taken by a vote of 53 to 21, and followed a discussion of nearly three hours. The amendment confining the increases to cabinet officers and presiding officers of the Senate and House was voted down, as was the proposition to postpone the increase until 1913.

William J. Bryan and wife have been the guests of Portland for a number of days. Mr. Bryan is much impressed with the present and future of the Beaver State, and will doubtless be more so if our electoral vote is cast for him in 1908. The distinguished gentleman is a warm admirer of Governor Chamberlain, and also voices the hope that the Governor will have opportunity to name a railroad commission for Oregon this spring.

Down in Sacramento, California, Assemblyman Devlin, of Vallejo, at the instance of the State Federation of Labor, introduced a bill making it unlawful to import Pinkertons or Farleyites for strike-breaking. It provides the right to carry arms or police power not to be granted to persons without six months' residence in the State.

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Wants Dairy Inspector.

A Cheese and dairy inspector is among the latest offices which will be created if the bill which was placed before the house by Representative Beals of Tillamook and Yambill should become a law. The officer would be appointed by Food and Dairy Commissioner Bailey, with an allowance of \$800 traveling expenses per annum, and his principal duties will be to inspect each and every cheese factory and dairy farm where milk is manufactured into cheese every year.

Besides this duty, when he has nothing else to do he will be required to give practical demonstrations in the art and science of cheese making. He will be clothed with the full power of an inspector and the authority to abolish or abate any violation or infraction of the laws of the State regulating the industry, and to remedy any defect derogatory to the health and wellbeing of the general public, so far as cheese making and consuming is concerned.—Salem Journal.

It was reported yesterday in shipping circles that a woman coal dealer in Eureka has bought 1,000 tons of coal from one of the local mines to be shipped to Eureka. Coal, it seems, is selling for a rather good figure in Eureka at present, most everyone at that place being compelled to pay \$17.50 a ton. When it can be bought for \$5 a ton a little profit can be made.—Times.

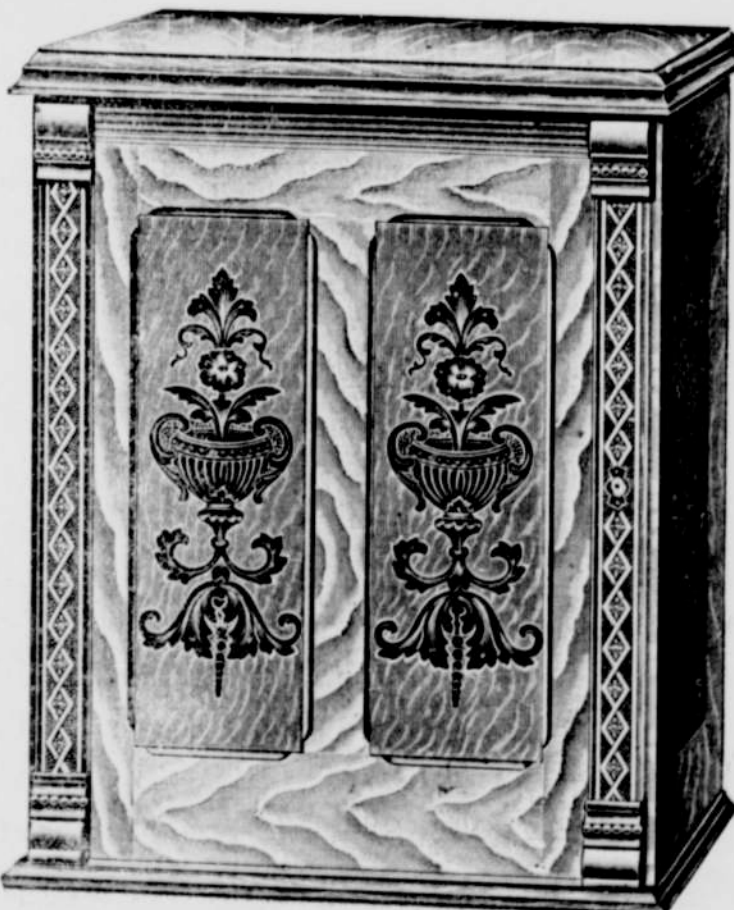
