Edgar L. Wheeler came over from Marsfield last Wednesday a week ago, and as the result of having to walk about 13 miles looked a trifle peaked and foot-sore. The storm made traveling rather strenuous life those days.

The Juvenile Masquerade given by the ladies of the Episcopal Guild at Bank Hall last Saturday evening was a decided success. There were a good number of maskers of youthful age, even several small tots, and the grotesque company made an interesting and entertaining scene. Refreshments were served in the hall. Seaside Orchestra furnished its usual good music.

Howard Wrenshall succumbed to dropsy at the home of he and his brothers in this city Monday morning about 4 o'clock. The unfortunate man had been practically an invalid all his life, but suffered particularly the last year or so. He was a native of England and 52 years of age. Two brothers and a sister, all residents of Bandon, survive him. The remains were laid at rest on Tuesday afternoon with brief but impressive ceremonies at the residence. Yesterday afternoon Rector Horsfall of the Episcopal Church preached the funeral sermon.

Millard F. Shoemaker lost about 110 piles from a raft of 415 Tuesday afternoon, the raft at the time being moored at the West Bandon dock for shipment on the schooner Sotoyome. A strong outcurrent caused the boom to break, and 110 of the poles went seaward before the bunch could be tied together again. The loss is a severe one to Mr. Shoemaker—about \$500. The steamer Liberty, which was lying near at the time, prevented a much greater loss by placing herself broadside to the piles, and so remaining until the boomsticks could be gotten back to place.

Dispatches tell of the wreck of the steam schooner National City at some point below San Francisco. This vessel was very well known up and down the coast.

The barge Chinook still occupies a berth on the Bandon water front, loaded and ready to move for San Francisco. The tug Wizard, which will tow the barge, seems to be due when she arrives.

The keel for another steam schooner is to be laid at Prosper just as soon as the present steamer is launched the end of the month. Mr. Heucken-dorff, like other shipbuilders, has plenty of business before him.

E. H. Fish, who has served as accountant for the Prosper Mill Co for some time past, has tendered his resignation, to take effect in a few days, and will move to Bandon to reside. The gentleman has plans for the future that may be spoken of later.

Miss Irene Lamb, the well known teacher of music, is to be married at Coquille this evening to Mr. Fay Jones of the county seat. Miss Effie Collier is to act in the capacity of bridesmaid. Miss Lamb's many friends in Bandon will join the Recorder in extending congratulations.

The new steamer under construction at the Heucken-dorff yard at Prosper will be ready to launch within two weeks. She is a trim looking vessel—as pretty a craft as will ever float in the waters of this river. When launched she will load with lumber and go to San Francisco to receive her machinery.

Lightkeeper O. Wren mourns the loss of his chicken house and one feathered inhabitant thereof. A wave of unusual proportions swept away the house the other day, but Wren did manage to save all his chickens but one—a plump brown leghorn. Her piteous "caw" as she disappeared among the billows will long be remembered by her master.

The gasoline schooner Sotoyome arrived from San Francisco last Friday, and landed the boilers and engines for the new Cody mill at the Cody wharf. There are four boilers and two engines, all of a superior strength and pattern. The balance of the mill machinery will arrive in due time, and meanwhile work goes steadily ahead preparing for its reception. The Sotoyome is loading with lumber, piling and matchwood this week, and expects to go to sea today. Captain Peterson is the new skipper on the vessel.
