The long mooted paper and pulp mill gives some promise of being a realization after all. The people of Bandon are awake when it comes to inviting new industries to the town, and it is fair to presume that the mass meeting tomorrow night will be a rousing affair. A paper and pulp mill should be a splendid investment in this community where the raw material is so available, though its construction of course represents considerable capital. The argument is advanced that \$8,000 per month would be disbursed in wages alone, not to mention the money expended for timber and other supplies, and the enterprise would pay handsome dividends to the stockholders from the start. Twenty-five per cent on the investment is the claim of the advocates of the mill, and they point to the flourishing Willamette Valley paper mill as an example. Beyond all doubt the factory would be a great addition to Bandon, and it is matter for congratulation that the outlook is so promising for its acquirement, many of our prominent citizens having increased their subscription for stock in the past several days.

The people of this section have reason to be gratified over the passage of the harbor appropriation bill through the lower house of Congress, carrying with it \$60,000 for the improvement of Coquille bar and river. That the bill will pass the Senate and receive the indorsement of the President is scarcely to be doubted; in fact it may have gone through after this article was penned. Sixty thousand dollars is more than we expected, but not more than the river deserves, considering its growing importance as an export center. That sum will accomplish a good deal, as the necessity of putting down tracks and providing equipment is avoided this year, but some portion of the appropriation is to be expended in improving the river, which is right and proper. Delegate Orvil Dodge has unquestionably done good work at Washington, but there was a combination of influences to bring about the results we have obtained.

The agitation for a change in this judicial district is timely and wise. In fact we believe the State would profit by changing its entire judicial system to that of the older and foremost States of the Union where each county has its Superior Court to try criminal, equity and probate cases as a whole. If a man accused of crime is innocent and deprived of his liberty for months it is a base injustice, and contrary to the spirit and intent of our constitution. The right of a speedy trial belongs to every person charged with crime, but in Oregon under our present system this right is oftentimes denied. Coos and Curry counties should at least be one judicial district with a judge and district attorney of its own. The growth of population and importance warrants this change, and our Solons at Salem should be importuned to act to that end.

The battle between the interior lumbermen and the Southern Pacific Company over the scarce car question is assuming an aggravated phase, as the following telegram from Cottage Grove, under recent date, would indicate: The Commercial Club here has once more sounded the bugle call for a meeting of the lumbermen and shippers of Central Oregon. The object of this meeting is to organize an association in order that the shippers may have a representative in a more compact form. The meeting is called for Saturday, February 9, in the afternoon. Invitations have been sent out, and there will be a large gathering. The organization will represent 30 sawmills and other shipping interests, and all others interested, together with the legislators, are urged to be present. The principal object in organization is to be able to force fully carry their grievances to the Salem lawmakers, and to be in a position to handle the various topics thereafter. The attitude of the Southern Pacific in maintaining an embargo on Southern shipments is simply paralyzing business, and on top of this the railroad announcement of the raise of rates from \$10 to \$5 is greatly irritating the shippers, and they are almost up in arms.

The Eugene Guard voices the belief that the Southern Pacific Company has abandoned its proposed extensions in Western Oregon, namely, the Drain-Coos bay and the Natron-Klamath branches. The hostility of Marshfield to the bridging of Coos bay, and the general clamor for curbing of the railroad monopoly in this State are said to have actuated the Espee in calling off its plans.

Death on the gallows is to be the penalty for burglary and highway robbery if the law-abiding elements in the Illinois Legislature prove strong enough to push the measure through. The alarming reign of crime in Chicago, which, despite the recent addition of 1200 policemen, is apparently constantly increasing, has moved Representative Church to frame a bill extending capital punishment to hold-ups and burglars.

A member of the Legislature from Baker county ventilated his wrath in the lower house a few days ago. He declared in vigorous language that his county is "tired of being the two white hairs in the tail of the Oregon black dog," and said that if things don't begin to come their way pretty soon, so that their mining and irrigation interests can be cared for, a new State east of the mountains will be the result.

Wm. C. Bristol, United States Attorney for Oregon, left for San Francisco last week to appear before the United States Circuit Court of Appeals in the case of Charles Nickell, appealed from the Circuit Court for this district, and in the case of several of the California defendants indicted for land frauds in Oregon, who have appealed to the higher court against removal to the Oregon court for trial.

Lawmakers will cost Oregon taxpayers \$10 a day each instead of \$3, now allowed by the constitution, if a concurrent resolution for a constitutional amendment presented by Representative Knowles, of Wasco, shall be adopted by the Senate and be ratified by the people in the election in June, 1908. The resolution was adopted by the House by a vote of 44 to 13, three being absent.

Among the recommendations made by State Land Agent West, in his biennial report to the Governor, is that as the State has about 500,000 acres of school land in Eastern Oregon which is unfit for anything except grazing, the State advertise the lands for lease in the same manner the Federal Government leases its grazing lands. He says that they should be leased, subject to sale, and, in the event of an opportunity to sell, the unearned portion of the rental paid should be returned.

The General Passenger Department of the Southern Pacific Company has been working faithfully for the rebuilding of San Francisco, issuing weekly the Journal of Progress which is sent everywhere. It tells of the progress made and plans for the future.
