What is the matter with the telephone system? The Bear Creek people have their lines to the edge of town already. Bandon should have had the local system in operation weeks ago.

We hear it reported that Steve Scotton, late of this office, will shortly establish another newspaper plant in this city. He is looking for a moneyed party that will back him in this enterprise. They say competition is the life of trade, so let it come.

The promoters of the new electric railway between Marshfield and North Bend have agreed with the latter city to lay their tracks on Sherman avenue before the pavement is put down on that thoroughfare. This will be a great advantage to the property owners on the street, for the reason that it will not be necessary to tear up the pavement in order to lay the tracks. This arrangement was reached between the city of North Bend and Hewett & Bell, who with L. J. Simpson will build the road. Seymons H. Bell is now in the city.—Marshfield Times.

Because a number of western state legislatures have had up for consideration bills making the standard passenger rate 2-cents per mile, some of the railroads have threatened to cancel all colonist rates. Public sentiment acknowledges this attitude of the railroad managers by increasing hostility toward railroad corporations. The public refuses to admit that it is really under the thumb of the railroads.

The Great Northern railroad management has threatened to abolish its colonist rates this spring if any state in the northwest adopts a 2-cent fare bill. The Northern Pacific management has not yet been heard from on the passenger rates subject. The Union Pacific has freely announced its colonist rates, but all transcontinental lines are withholding announcement of cheap convention rates for the season of 1907.

Traffic connections with the Coos Bay Roseburg & Eastern Railway have been severed by the Pacific Railway & Steamship Company, owners of the steamer F. A. Kilburn, for the alleged reason that the railway insists upon being paid about half the freight charges from Portland for transporting goods no more than 15 to 20 miles after they have been delivered at Marshfield. William Baker, agent of the Kilburn, was advised by the San Francisco office yesterday not to receive freight for shipment on the railway line. The Coos Bay Roseburg & Eastern runs from Marshfield to Myrtle Point, a distance of 23 miles. Freight on the Kilburn is carried to Marshfield at \$1 a ton. If it goes to Myrtle Point the railroad people exact \$2 a ton, which amount comes out of the freight charges collected by the steamship line. Coquille is but 13 miles from Marshfield, and on the railroad line. If freight is sent there from Portland it is alleged that the railroad people demand an unreasonable division of the tariff receipts. Under the arrangements which will now be made by the steamship people they will quote rates to the Coos Bay country to no other points than Marshfield and North Bend.
