Bandon 10 Years Ago.

At the annual school meeting on Monday Elbert Dyer was elected to succeed R. H. Rosa, whose term of office expired, and W. D. Shoemaker was elected to fill the unexpired term of Robert Walker, resigned. M. I. Swift was chosen to serve as clerk for the current year.
