Work Stopped on New Road.

For some time it has been known that the C. E. Loss Co., which had the contract for building the first 20 miles of the new Drain-Coos Bay railroad, was without funds and unable to pay its bills or sub-contractors, says the Drain Nonpartiel.

The climax came early Sunday morning, when Lawyer A. C. Emmons, W. E. Reed, a private detective, and J. S. Holland, all of Portland, arrived here, alleging they had been sent by Mr. Loss for the purpose of securing the books and papers relative to the affairs of the Loss Co. Reed and Holland proceeded at once to the company's office, effected an entrance and packed up all of the books and papers that could be found, including some private property belonging to T. J. Tobin, general manager for the Loss Co. Mr. Tobin, knowing that Loss was without funds, with unpaid bills amounting to nearly \$50,000 against the company, believed this bold action was a scheme to defraud the sub-contractors and creditors, and he very properly made an attempt to recover the books and papers taken away. Mr. Tobin had all three of them arrested on a charge of technical burglary. At their preliminary examination Wednesday, Justice Sterling held Reed and Holland to the grand jury under bonds of \$1,000 each, which they furnished.

The creditors, mostly Portland people, have attached all of the provisions and grading tools between Drain and Elkton, belonging to the Loss Co.

Mr. Loss has been released from his contract by Chief Engineer Hood of San Francisco and another contract will be let at once to other and more reliable parties. There is not the slightest doubt that the muddle will all be straightened out by next month and that construction work will be pushed right along with renewed activity and vigor.

Bandon 10 Years Ago.

On her trip down to San Francisco, from Gray's Harbor, the steamer Coquille River carried a load of lumber estimated to weigh as much as 455 long tons of coal. This was done on a draft of less than twelve feet, and it is estimated that she can carry 300 tons on less than ten feet draft.

R. W. Hayter brought in word this week of a new strike of black sand on Bill's creek. It prospects well and has the appearance of containing gold in paying quantities. Messrs. Hayter and Lindebeck are the discoverers and are now putting in sluices to demonstrate the actual value of the find.

The steamer Coquille River, of which we mention last week as having been towed into San Francisco from Point Arena, was out of coal. As previously stated she had been out ten days from Gray's Harbor. During 24 hours of the trip the gale was so fierce that no headway was made. She had used a thousand feet of lumber for fuel when taken in tow.

Rev. W. Horsfall, of the Episcopal church is going to build a residence on the property he has bought in Bandon. The present Episcopal district is going to be divided into two districts. Bandon will be the center of one and it will embrace all the towns on the Coquille river and all of Curry county. We will then have four resident ministers. One belonging to the M. E. church, north, M. E. church, south, Presbyterian church, Episcopal church. These four we hope will be sufficient to secure the salvation of the few sinners to be found in Bandon.

W. Taylor, W. Donk and M. Hayter are washing out a test lot of sand on the Parker place, a couple of miles east of town this week.

Miss Nellie Malehorn was in town Wednesday night on her way home to visit her parents on Floras creek. She will return to Portland in a few days.

Attorney J. Huntley, of Gold Beach, was in town Wednesday night on his way home from Salem where he had gone to contest W. H. Nosler's seat as representative.

Coquille Notes.

Two attendants from the hospital at Salem arrived in town Saturday. They came to take charge of Geo. Bethel of near Bandon who will be taken to Salem for treatment.

The lower floor of the addition to the Woodman building will be occupied by W. T. Kerr and C. H. Banning, the former with a stock of dry goods and clothing and the latter with groceries.

Mrs. R. H. Mast has received word that her half brother, Capt. P. H. Crim, had died at Auburn, Cal., Jan. 28th. The deceased was an old time navigator on the Pacific coast and was well known in this county.

Sheriff Gage received a letter last week from an attorney in Boise, Idaho, who wanted to know of the whereabouts of John Harrison Pierce, who is thought to have relatives in Myrtle Point. The young man's father died recently in the insane asylum at Blackfoot, Idaho leaving money to the value of \$3,000 besides other property.

Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Messer and M. O. Hawkins will leave next week for an extended trip through the middle west and southwest. They will visit in Missouri, New Mexico and several other places during their absence, which will be for three months or more. Mrs. Hawkins, who leaves today for Berkeley, Calif. will join them in that place.

The Bandon Recorder changed hands last week, the ownership passing from the hands of George P. Laird to Irving Bath, late of Hillsboro. We are sorry to see Mr. Laird leave the newspaper field, but are glad to know that the paper passes into the hands of one who will keep that newsy sheet up to the high standard of the past. Mr. Bath is a newcomer to this section, but comes highly recommended and from a family of newspaper men. We heartily welcome him to Coos county field.

Port Orford Notes.
