Robert Forty, who has been working at Wedderburn, came up Monday, and says that Hume's tug will come up as soon as the weather moderates and make another attempt to recover the Bessie K.

George Forty is building a large flat-bottomed boat, to be used in landing goods on the beach, for J. R. Miller, who expects to have his new gasoline schooner in commission some time in April.

John Deadmond is now quite well and is living in town with his nephew Henry McBride.

Attorney J. N. True and wife returned to Gold Beach by Wednesday's stage, having had a fine time visiting their black sand mine.

A. Jamieson says the Bandon road district has a rock crusher and that they have constructed this side of Rosa's mile or more of splendid road, under the direction of Tom Coates, their efficient supervisor, to whom Mr. Jamieson is under obligations for for his aid in keeping the bad ruts repaired while freighting the heavy stuff from Bandon to Cape Blanco for the wireless station.

The Berwick, and tug Katie Cook both being Hume's vessels, tried to raise the anchor that holds the Bessie K. on the reef near Island Rock, but failed to do so and they both went back to Rogue river. The chain will have to be cut to free the wreck. It is a difficult thing to do because of the short taut chain. In the meanwhile the equinoctial storm is due, and will probably land the prize without any aid from man. If the Captain that towed the wreck inside of Cape Blanco Reef had brought it to Port Orford he could have made some money, and the vessel could have been saved.

On Saturday evening, March 16th, occurred the wedding of Mr. Edward G. Lawrence and Miss Ella Stella Robinson at Marshfield, Rev. Thurston officiating. The groom is the second son of Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Lawrence of this city and is well and favorably known in this community, having been born and raised in this city. The bride has been a resident of Marshfield for several years, and has a host of friends. The couple will reside at Jack McDonald's camp where Ned will be employed the present season.

San Jose papers received in this city by friends of "Happy" Smith, who is playing with the baseball club of that city, says that "Happy" has made good and is one of the strongest players in the club. The paper in speaking of a game in which he played says that he made four runs out of five times at bat, two of them being two baggers. The paper also adds that he gets over the ground and also predicts that he surprised all by the way he gets over the ground and also predicts that in the course of time "Happy" will be playing in the Eastern league. Bandon 10 Years Ago.

N. Loreoz is having the partition taken out of his store building and will have tables in the center. This arrangement will be much more convenient than it has hitherto been.

The Coquille River carried 325 tons of lump coal and 65 tons of fuel on this trip on a draft of 10 feet 3 inches aft and 9 feet forward. It is estimated that she will take 400 tons of coal, besides her 60 tons of fuel on a draft of very little over ten feet.

Chas. M. Howard and wife came down from the Pioneer Gold Mining Company's mines back of Randolph last Friday, for a short visit to town. This company is putting in a large amount of machinery and Mr. Howard thinks that he will have the plant ready for operation in about ten days.

Last Wednesday evening C. W. Zumwalt, following the usual custom, drove into the surf at Battle Rock to wash the mud from his wagon and team, leaving in the wagon at the time three of his little boys, the youngest being only two or three years old. Just as he was in the act

of turning his team to drive out, a large breaker struck the wagon broadside, turning it bottom up, and it was only by the greatest good fortune that some or all of the children were not killed or drowned. Mr. Zumwalt was thrown down, and had much difficulty in extricating himself. The oldest boy, John Henry, grasped the little one by the back of the neck, and held to him manfully until rescued, while the middle one was thrown ashore by the breaker that capsized the wagon.

A. M. Sumner has purchased the old John Moore house at Horseshoe bay and is tearing it down and will take the lumber to his lots on Ferry creek, where he is making preparation to build a house. Report got about that the Moore house was the first hotel building in Bandon but investigation brings out the fact that the Nelson house just south of George Bennett's house was the first hotel in this vicinity, and that the next one was the Ocean House established by J. P. Tupper, and that the Gold Beach which is close to the place where the John Moore dwelling stood, was afterward built and opened up as a hotel by A. Geromi, a Frenchman who married a daughter of Nelson, the first hotel keeper. Geromi used to remark that he "made all the biz and Tupper made all the mon."

Suppresses Publication.

Among the very last of the official acts of Geo. B. Cortelyou before resigning the postmaster generalship was to order the United States mails closed to that widely read publication, "The Woman's Magazine," published at St. Louis. No reason was given for this extraordinary ruling. The Woman's Magazine has been regularly mailed at the St. Louis post office for the past six years, and is one of the few magazines that has religiously refused to accept fake or objectionable advertising matter, and its columns were at all times filled with wholesome literature. The Woman's Magazine has however, in its editorial pages, attacked certain measures, and exposed alleged frauds in Mr. Cortelyou's department is said by the million or more subscribers to the popular publication to be the reason of the official displeasure. The matter will go into the courts, and we hope will be sifted to the very depths. If the Postmaster General has the power to thus set himself up as a general press censor of American newspapers and magazines, is time the public knows it. We as a people, have fondly believed in the freedom of the press, free speech, and the right to exercise our conscientious beliefs, but if the power does lie in hand of any hireling of the government to deprive us of any part of these privileges, then it is up to the public to remove the cause of such disturbance.—Umpqua Valley News.
