The new steam schooner will run between Bandon and San Francisco, and will be equipped with the latest twin screw machinery. The new schooner Wellesley is now loading at the Aberdeen dock. She is expected to be through loading Sunday and will then be towed up to the Bay by the tug Columbia where she will finish loading. She can only take on about 200,000 feet of lumber here on account of the shallow bar. At the Bay she will take on about 600,000 feet more at the Simpson Mill. She will then be towed to San Francisco where the latest and best marine machinery will be installed. She will probably run between the Bay and San Francisco.
