AS AN INCENTIVE to keep their homes looking fine and beautifying the grounds surrounding them, the *Maverick*, a newspaper of Mountain Home, offers prizes to the amount of \$150 in gold.

THE STATE has gone out of the gambling business, and there will be no more pool selling in the future at our State Fairs. A great many other states had stopped this gambling menace years ago, and as Oregon is just in the midst of great development and improvement it is a decided step toward clean racing. The State Board brought this about and are to be congratulated for the stand they took in the matter.

THE CALIFORNIA legislature has gone after the cigarette imbiber. The anti cigarette bill introduced by Markley makes it unlawful to either sell, give, or to furnish any person with cigarettes or the papers for their making. The Governor has already affixed his signature to the bill and it will go into effect in sixty days. The penalty for violating this law is a fine not exceeding \$200 or imprisonment in the county jail of not more than six months, or both.

THE STEAMER KILBURN has been chartered to take one hundred tons of railroad iron into Tillamook for the new Pacific Railway and Navigation Co., now building between that place and Hillsboro. Work is being rapidly constructed at both ends, and by the end of the year it is hoped the two ends will meet. Tillamook is an ideal summer resort for the Portlanders, and with the new through road direct to the ocean, it will bring a great many people into that country. As it is, they are as far off the railroad as we are and need it twice as bad, as their boat service is exceptionally irregular.

The Drain Commercial Club has just ordered 5000 folders printed, containing information usually wanted by homeseekers. Read it in this issue, under the head of "Drain." Every citizen in town should have some of these folders to send to their relatives and friends who want to know something about this country. THE APRIL Everybody's contains the following on the wonderful success of Jas J. Hill, the railroad magnate. There are men living today who worked along side of Hill when he was employed as a section hand, who are still in the same humble circumstances as they were 25 years ago:

"He was baggage man, conductor, engineer, track-walker, fireman, passenger agent, traffic manager, and everything else on the road at different times," one of the men who was with him as assistant at this time told me.

"He looked after every detail, until those who watched him were appalled. Not a box of rubber bands was bought that he didn't O.K. the order, and supervise payment. He not only learned how the work was being done, but devised methods of doing it differently, doing it better, more economically, more expeditiously. System followed in his wake, system in every department. Railroaded, as he found it, was an involved, cumbersome, chaotic affair. He made it a science."

THE FOLLOWING is gleaned from an exchange, and while we are not troubled with dogs infected with rabies, it is a good thing to remember. Mad dogs do not attack people. This is the statement made by Dr. P. M. Hall, city health commissioner. "When a dog has the rabies," said Dr. Hall, "he has lost control of his body and what he does is mechanical. His jaws snap involuntarily, and if he encounters any object, whether animate or inanimate, he is likely to bite it, but a mad dog does not attack as does an angry dog. He does not pick out a victim nor use any strategy. For this reason dogs suffering from rabies are less dangerous than is supposed. No grown person need fear them, for all he has to do is to get out of the way, the dog will not chase him. Of course, young children are in danger, as they do not know how to dodge the brute. A well-directed kick in the jaw delivered by a man of ordinary strength will put a mad dog out of business for a time at least, and is much easier to land than it would be if the dog were merely angry and had control of himself."

WE REPRINT, below, an article taken from the Del Norte Record on the Jap question. This article is a letter formerly sent to a high government official in Washington, by a long-earred Seattle crank who has no more use for brains than a cat has for fins. The very idea that the Japanese cooks on the war vessels can cause the destruction of those boats, is ludicrous in the extreme. Thos Edison, the greatest man the mechanical world has ever known, can establish a chain of mines fifty miles out to sea, that would render it impossible for any vessel to pass either way. Such articles as this only tend to increase the hat band of the Japs, who are elated enough after whipping a lot of half starved Russians. The sympathies of the United States are with them and it will be their best policy to keep in our good graces. Following is the article:

A map of the United States as it will appear in 1909, and how it happened.

On September 7, 1907, without a minutes warning, the Japs, who were employed exclusively on all the railroads on the Pacific Coast as section hands, dynamited all bridges and tunnels, tore up and rendered worthless all railroad tracks as far east as Idaho on the Great Northern and Northern Pacific Railroads, further south, all roads crossing the mountains.

On the same day all defences on Puget Sound, the mouth of the Columbia River, the Golden Gate, and down to San Diego, were destroyed and rendered useless by the Japs.

On the same day the Japanese fleet entered Puget Sound, San Francisco, and all southern ports without any resistance whatever. Twenty-five thousand Japs were landed in Puget Sound territory, one hundred thousand in San Francisco, and fifty thousand in other southern ports.

The same day the Hawaiian Islands were taken by the Japs already there. The Jap force moved as fast as possible eastward where the tracks were torn up, and began to fortify all the important points.

It took the United States forty days to organize and equip one hundred and fifty thousand soldiers with

which to attack the Japs in their already prepared defences.

It takes only twelve days to sail from Japan to America, and while the United States were forwarding troops and landing them in an alkali desert of the west, the Japs were landing their soldiers by the hundred thousands, and in sixty days every crag in the mountains was bristling with Japanese guns. The Japs had full possession of the Pacific Coast, and could concentrate their forces almost within a day at any point desirable.

Our war boats were also rendered useless by the Jap cooks and employees and were easily destroyed. Our navy on the Pacific was totally destroyed.

After the war was started Mr. J. Bull also assisted the Mikado—attacked our Atlantic Coast, destroyed our navy, and forced a peace, whereby we lost the whole Pacific Coast forever. J. Bull took for his trouble Alaska and all the country north of the Columbia River, thence east along the 45th degree of latitude to the Mississippi River, thence north-easterly to Lake Superior.

In 1930 the white population of the Pacific Coast will be only 1300.

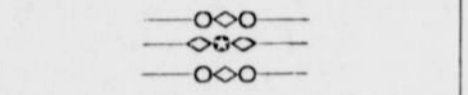
The Japanese army of 1,200,000 remained on the Pacific Coast, made a part of Japan, and always will be a menace to our peace and country.
