Mr. and Mrs. Henry Spangler, Mr. Mrs. Jos. Spangler and daughter Ruth, all of Findlay, Ohio, arrived in Bandon Tuesday where they will make their permanent home. The two gentlemen will take up home steads in this vicinity.

Haldon Foss returned from Washington last Saturday evening and has accepted a year's contract with the Shingle Mill people. His return has been long looked for by the members of the band of which he was a member, and he arrived in time to assist in the concert last Saturday night.

Panter Bros. have received the finest National Cash Register that has been seen in these parts. It is a large commodious affair, containing four drawers thus giving individual service for each clerk. A tag is issued for each purchase, and it has all of the conveniences of all the machines. The price of this piece of mechanism was \$570. Lorenz & Hoyt have ordered a machine similar to this one.

The Band Concert was fairly well attended last Saturday night. The boys took in something over \$85, which will leave them a little over expenses. The dance in the Bank hall was very largely attended after the program and the dancers held forth until the small hours. Those in attendance at the concert speak very highly of the musicale and will be glad when the band commence their summer concerts on the streets.

G. W. Messenger was overwhelmed with troubles last Saturday and sought relief in the cup that cheers. After whipping most of the lamp post in town, he was gathered in by night watchman Wm. Clarke, who gave him quarters for the evening in the local bastille. Owing to the fact that the following day was Sunday, he was required to remain in his quarters until Monday morning when his case was brought up before Justice Strang. After duly considering the matter, the scales of justice were ten simoleaus shy on his side and he was allowed the privilege of leaving that amount, on the bar of justice.

Capt. S. H. Whitney and wife and child passed through Bandon last night enroute for Portland where he will spend the coming six weeks in experimenting with black sand. He is interested in this mode of mining and has a fine lot of machinery installed at his mine near Port Orford. A giant hydraulic is used, and he is satisfied the project is a good paying proposition. The black sand yields about 40 per cent of magnetite, or the finest grade of steel, and as this sells for about \$35 per ton in San Francisco, pays more than the gold does. The sand pays five to seventy dollars to the ton in gold and from one to five in platinum. With the new device he expects to mine for the magnetite, and will afterward take out the gold and platinum.

Chas. Bloom Drowned.

Chas. Bloom, of North Bend, fell off the steamer Echo last Saturday night on the excursion to Arago, and was drowned. The young man had been drinking very heavily and was pretty well intoxicated. He fell from the boat about 3 1/2 miles above Coquille near the Albert Clinton place.

A life boat was launched by Jim Lee and Paul Girard, which capsized, and by the time the other boat could be launched the unfortunate man had disappeared. The body was found about one o'clock seventy-five yards down stream.

Bloom was a single man and had no relatives closer than Eureka, to which place the body will be shipped. He was not a member of any fraternal organization, but had many friends in this vicinity. He had been working in a shingle mill near Coquille, and was in Bandon visiting friends about two weeks ago. He was 35 years of age.

The schooner Bender Brothers and Barge Chinook are ready for sea waiting for the tug "Wizard" to tow them to Bandon. The Bender Brothers is consigned to the Bandon Commercial Co. and loads at Bandon.

The gasoline schooner Monterey will be ready for sea in about a week and will probably be loaded at Bandon by the same people. This schooner has the reputation of being the fastest gasoline schooner on the coast and will be a valuable addition to the fleet now sailing between San Francisco and Bandon. She is expected to make steamer time.
