## Money For The Jetty.

The Telegram dated Monday has the following about the Jetty and River work to be commenced here very shortly:

Colonel S. W. Roessler was officially notified this morning of the passage of the river and harbor bill by Congress, and of the sums set aside for improvement work in this district. He was also instructed to forward to the Chief Engineer a list of the several projects under way in the district, and to report on what work has to be done. The request of the department is being attended to today, and in a week or so the extension of the Government jetty at the mouth of the Columbia river will be in full progress.

As soon as the list is received in Washington, Colonel Roessler says it is customary for the department to send a telegraph message to each of the engineers in charge, empowering them to go ahead. Rock and other material for extending the jetty will be secured in the open market until arrangements can be completed to get them from the lowest bidders by advertising. Considerable lumber is already on the grounds, and it is probable that on the start rock will be secured at Fisher's quarry.

Colonel Roessler was also notified that the new dredge for operation in Oregon and Washington waters, for which an appropriation of \$120,000 was made, will be built under the direction of the Portland office, instead of being left to the Seattle force of United States Engineers. In the bill nothing was said about this matter, and there was a conflict in opinions. The Chief of Engineers decided in favor of Portland.

The new dredge will be operated at Coos and Tillamook Bays and at the several ports of Washington, deepening the channels and making other improvements. The building of the craft will be let to the lowest bidder. Seattle will have a chance to get the work, but her contractors will have to apply for the business through the Portland office.

Before long the work of building several drill scows and a steamer for use as a tender on the Upper Columbia River will be started. They will be used for making improvements to the river between Celilo and the Snake River. When spring opens in good shape operations all over the district in the river and harbor line will be in full blast.

Last Saturday's Journal contains the following in reference to the jetty: Colonel S. W. Roessler, United States engineer, this morning forwarded his specifications for the extension of the north jetty at the mouth of the Coquille river to the department at Washington for its approval. It is believed that the specifications will be back here soon when bids for the work will at once be invited.

The government recently appropriated \$60,000 for the extension of the Coquille jetty and it is believed that the work can be accomplished with less than that amount. The south jetty was completed some four years ago and the 1,600-foot north arm is to be extended 285 feet.

The jetty is being built of stone obtained from the quarries on the Bandon side of the Coquille river and hauled across the waterway by means of barges attached to cables. Thus the work is made comparatively inexpensive.

With the north arm of the jetty also completed it is believed that there will be a depth of at least 10 feet of water on the bar at low water, or a foot more than at the time of the last government survey, when nine feet was recorded.

The completion of the jetty is much desired by the people of the Coquille country, who are anxious to establish regular steamship connections with Portland, and Colonel Roessler is of the opinion that it can be done this summer.

## Coquille Notes.

From the Sentinel.

W. A. Goodman and son Earl started preparations yesterday for moving the dwelling known as the Root property, next to Johnson's soda works. The house will be taken to a vacant lot on the east side of the next street.

N. Plyler and wife will leave next week for a stay of a year or more in California, Mr. Plyler having secured a good position in that state. Mr. C. R. Barrow and family will occupy the Plyler property as soon as vacated.

The rain of the past week or more brought the river up considerably, and a great many logs were floated

down stream. Fully 4000 were started at one time, and Chas. Ashton and others were kept busy with their catching apparatus.

Wm. C. Harris, the well known rancher and storekeeper of Sumner gave an option for the sale of his property last Monday to a gentleman named Clark. It is understood that Mr. Clark deposited \$500 as a forfeit to bind the bargain.

The local sawmill closed down Wednesday noon because of a depletion of the log supply. The high water and strong current carried all the logs below Coquille before the mill could get a new supply, and they cannot be gotten back until the stream recedes.

A. J. Sherwood's new gasoline boat "Mud Hen" is now receiving its finishing touches preparatory to being its initial bath in the waters of the Coquille. The boat will prove one of the prettiest and speediest on the river. It was constructed by Edwin Ellingson.

The remains of C. F. Allen were brought up from Bandon last week and were kept in Ellingson's undertaking rooms awaiting the arrival of Mrs. Allen and son, who came last Sunday. The remains were shipped to San Francisco yesterday accompanied by the widow and son.

Ed. and John Ansen are preparing to move the Pike logging equipment, now owned by them, to their main camp two miles east of town, the Pike claim being entirely logged off. The logs therein have been dumped in the river, and on Wednesday the camp donkey was taken across the stream to be used in floating such logs as became grounded by the late rise in the river. There were about eighty five to float belonging to the Ansen boys.

Prof. W. A. Henry received very sad news by telegraph Wednesday. It was a message conveying the simple announcement of the death of his father at the family home in Las Vegas, New Mexico. While deceased was quite old—past 82 years—and while it was known he was not in the best of health, the news nevertheless was sudden and a great shock to his son in Coquille. The remains will be buried in Las Vegas where the aged mother survives and makes her residence.
