THE THIRD TERM project for running Roosevelt for another term was knocked in the head by him, when he said he didn't want it and was going to keep out. If he holds to his word it will give Taft a chance to be measured for the Presidential chair.

IF PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT is trying to make a hit with the negro in his last term of office, he is certainly succeeding beyond all expectation. He has appointed a "colored gem" as auditor of the navy department. They must have been short on white men in Washington.

THE THAW JURY disagreed and the case will be re-tried next October. Meanwhile Thaw will try and secure bail. The jury stood seven for death and five for acquittal, and after being out forty-seven hours returned with no verdict. Again the family skeleton of the Thaw family will be aired to the public by the press and the State pays the freight.

THE RADIUM, R. D. Hume's paper at Wedderburn, has secured the services of W. E. Thresher, of Las Vegas, N. M., who will take charge in editorial capacity. H. J. Crippen, the former editor left the paper some three months ago causing its suspension. We are pleased to welcome this new exchange to our table and extend the hand of good fellowship in wishing success to its new editor.

THE COLD STORAGE egg trust in New York held up the price of their stale product to 28 and 30 cents a dozen until well into March by getting a corner on the market. It took an arrival of \$23,000,000 worth of eggs in two days, to burst a hole in the trust and force them to let go their grip. The price dropped 10 cents a dozen in twenty-four hours, and relieve a famine in eggs that has been kept up all winter by those sharpers.

OUR COPY of the extra edition of the Coos Bay Harbor was a week late but nevertheless shows merit and deserves a boost. It is sixteen pages, and is profusely illustrated with photos of Coos Bay scenery and business scenes. The descriptive write-up of that section will attract large numbers of homeseekers heading this way, and gives some valuable information regarding opportunities of North Bend.

THE TILLAMOOK Herald has been served with a summons in a libel suit brought on by Wm Ryan. The alleged libelous article was on the Tillamook toll road and made strong assertion against Jas. Beeber and Wm. Ryan, who were the instigators of the destruction of the toll gate according to the article. Our personal acquaintance with the editor leads us to remark that "Rollie" will be able to take care of himself. He has just blossomed out with an eight page, all home print paper.

IN THE LAST issue of the Coquille Sentinel appears an article by the editor repudiating a communication in the issue of this paper of April fifth. The writer of the communication is a Bandon San Francisco business man, in no way connected with the railroad company nor does he in any way desire to knock this place or any other place in the county. When sending the communication to this paper he said it was for the purpose of correcting statements referring to the interest of the community

at large and not with any desire to antagonize. He is at present in San Francisco.

THE GIRLS who are to represent Oregon at Jamestown, seem to be having all kinds of trouble getting started. Some of the advocates of the scheme of advertising Oregon in this way, want the young ladies to dress in the native Indian garb. The people of the East now have a bad enough impression of the West, without sending there young ladies dressed as Indians. The general opinion of the Easterner is that everybody carries a gun and shoots at the slightest provocation. The Oregon girl is supposed to be able to ride astride a bronco, smoke cigarettes, spit through her teeth and swear like a pirate. Why not send these girls East to show we are civilized beings rather than savages. There may be feminine beauty in the Indian dress, but as yet we have failed to see it.

The arraignment of Evelyn Thaw's mother by Attorney Delmas, bitter and scathing as it was, was well merited. A woman so relevant to all maternal affection, so utterly cruel in the infliction of torture upon a daughter that she alone could inflict, is either a monster of iniquity or a monument of weakness. Detestation of this woman in the maternal capacity cannot be interpreted as sympathy for Thaw, the record of whose villainess has been opened to the public. It is simply the revolt of humanity against that most disordered creature—an unnatural mother.—Oregonian.

The English press has treated the outspoken determination of the California people to check the inflow of Japanese labor with great respect and the Milwaukee Sentinel explains why. The Sentinel says: "The fact is, the British government has an analogous and equally embarrassing situation to deal with in the colonies. In Australia and British Columbia the Japanese laborer is unwelcome; and now the proceedings of the first Transvaal parliament under the recently enacted constitution make it evident that the 'Asiatic ordinance' against oriental labor which was recently disallowed by the imperial state secretary for the colonies will be reenacted. The ordinance was aimed specially at the Chinese contract laborers who were imported in gangs (under a proviso for segregation and repatriation after the expiration of the contract period) to work the mines of the Rand. But it is intended also to exclude Japanese who are going to South Africa in increasing numbers. Of this ordinance, Sir Gilbert Parker says that the imperial government will hardly venture again to disallow it 'as more than 99 per cent of the whites in South Africa thoroughly approve it.' They are determined to have a 'white man's country.' So in the Transvaal there is an economic anti-Japanese sentiment, or a movement to exclude Japanese labor, similar to the exclusion sentiment in California; and there the central or general government is that of Japan's ally. With this embarrassment on her own hands England is in no position to please her ally by taking a strong, moral stand against the sentiment in California."—Commoner.

Files Suit.

The Oregon Railroad & Navigation company has filed a libel in Judge Woolverton's court at Portland against the steam schooner Coquille River, asking the court to grant an order of attachment of the schooner, her cargo of lumber and tackle, to be sold to satisfy a salvage charge alleged to be due for the services of the tug Tatoosh which came to the aid of the schooner during a storm outside of the Columbia River bar, and brought her to Astoria. W. W. Cotton and Arthur C. Spence are attorneys for the libelants.—Times.
