**Electric Road.**

Over burdened, every boat into the Bay is crowded. The Umpqua Valley News, Roseburg, says editorially in reference to this new project:

"The proposed electric road to Coos Bay is taking on material shape. The business men of Roseburg are awake to the feasibility of the plan and its acknowledged necessity. Once incorporated, stock in the company will be worth one hundred cents on the dollar to begin with, and we predict that every citizen of the town will be getting in on the ground floor in the matter of investing in the proposition. Electricity is in the air, and that Coos Bay road is sure to come."

Following is the report of the Secretary of the meeting:

The mass meeting called under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce, Tuesday evening was attended by a goodly representation of Bandon's citizens and business men, and after listening to Mr. Barzee's able exposition of the benefits of proposed railways between Roseburg and the Coos country and interesting talks by the various members of his audience, the following resolution was offered and unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, By this meeting of the citizens of Bandon, that we are heartily in sympathy with the movement inaugurated by the citizens of Roseburg and advocated here by Mr. Barzee, for the construction of a system of electric railways connecting Douglas and Coos Counties, and more especially as to the route via Myrtle Point to Bandon.

**Special Meeting.**

A special meeting of the officers of the Bandon Athletic Club was held Tuesday evening April 30, for the purpose of making arrangements for the purchasing of apparatus for the club and the following business was transacted:

Meeting was called to order by President Donald Charleson, after which a general discussion on ways and means of getting apparatus for the club ensued. The following motions were made, seconded and carried. That the President be empowered to pay \$500 for the apparatus of the old Athletic Club and use his own option as to buying any part thereof. That the president be empowered with the authority of calling a meeting of the stockholders of the club, through the next issue of the Bandon Recorder, on Friday evening, May 3rd at 8 o'clock. That a committee of three be appointed to purchase the apparatus of the club, the president acting as one and appointing two—G. T. Treadgold and Ernest Erickson appointed. That whereas according to the terms of the contract existing between Shields & Kennedy and the trustees of the Bandon Athletic Club, the sum of \$20 is now due and owing them from said club. Therefore be it resolved that the secretary is hereby directed to issue them an order upon the treasurer for said sum and the treasurer is empowered and required to honor same upon presentation, and that the secretary be empowered to get all necessary material for keeping the books of the club.

After a general discussion on welfare of the club, the meeting was adjourned.

The future prospects of the club are looking up to becoming one of the leading clubs of the county and the members are showing great interest. Shields and Kennedy have renounced the ball and arranged it satisfactory to the board of directors, and new apparatus will be ordered at once and installed as soon as convenient. The membership has reached the two hundred mark, and still increasing and the treasurer holds \$220 on hand.

**Steam Laundry.**

Mr. Nosler of the Coquille Steam Laundry was a caller at this office last Saturday and stated that work will commence as soon as lumber can be obtained, on the new laundry for Bandon. They decided to build for themselves and have bought the lot east of the old Woolen Mill. They will erect a building 30x44, two stories, and a shed. This will give employment to 6 or 8 hands on the start and will increase with the business.

A delivery wagon will be put on in a couple of weeks and laundry will be called for Mondays and Wednesdays and returned Saturdays. The work will be sent to Coquille until the plant is installed here.

**Smashed Her Hand.**

Last Saturday evening, just before closing time at the Woolen Mill, Miss Alma Nelson caught her hand in the cog wheels of the loom at which she was working, and smashed her hand so badly that part of two fingers had to be amputated. She had cleaned up one loom, and was engaged in cleaning up the other. Contrary to the rules, she had not shut the machine down and in wiping around the cog wheels the waste she was using caught and drew her hand through with it.

She was taken over to Dr. Honston's office, where, upon examination, it was found necessary to remove the smashed fingers. The first finger was amputated above the second joint and the other at the first joint. Both were on her right hand. Fortunately the young lady is left-handed.

Miss Nelson was taken on a stretcher to her home on the hill and at last reports is getting along very nicely. She has been in the woolen mill since it was started, and worked in the old one for several years. No blame is attached to the mill, and she says the accident was due to carelessness. The rules provide that the looms are to be shut down at 5:30 in order to clean them, and persons operating two looms may shut them down at 5:15.

**Death of Niels Pederson.**

Niels Pederson, an old and respected citizen of this county, died at his home at Prosper, last Saturday night. He worked in the garden the day previous and that in connection with long trouble is responsible for his untimely death.

The deceased was born in Norway and came to the United States when a boy. He moved to Coos county and was the original owner of the townsite of Prosper. He was a corporal in Co. K. First Oregon National Guards, and was an honest upright man and the community will lose one of its best citizens. Deceased leaves besides his wife, Gerda Pederson, seven children; John, Norman, Arthur, Amelia, Gerda, Nome, and Olga Pederson Hungell.

The funeral was held Tuesday and the body was brought to Bandon on the morning boat. Interment in the Bandon Cemetery.
