City Restaurant Set On Fire

D. BOONE ARRESTED

Fire Discovered at 10:30 in the Store Room of A. Munck.

Last Sunday night one of the most dastardly attempts of crime that has been perpetrated in this community was the setting of the fire at the City Restaurant. The entire business section might have been destroyed owing to the dry condition, and nothing could have stopped the fire if it had gotten under headway. That the fire was of incendiary origin is a positive certainty; everything in connection proves it.

The store room, in which Munck keeps his liquors, adjoining the restaurant, was filled with cases containing bottled goods which were packed in straw. The straw was saturated with kerosene, and the flames burned high up on the walls.

The first discovery of the fire was by Miss Ethel Van Valkenburgh, an invalid, about 10:30 p. m., who smelled the smoke. At first she thought it was caused by a lamp, and she called Doctor Conover, who was sitting up with her, and asked him to locate the lamp. The volume of smoke increased and the doctor, failing to find the fire in the upper story, went down stairs and out into the kitchen. Here he saw the flames in the store house. By this time other occupants of the house were at the scene and together they put out the flames. Comparatively little damage had been done. The side of the building had been badly scorched and the cases were burned.

Daniel Boone, husband of the present proprietor of the restaurant, was arrested the next morning on suspicion. He had just returned last Friday and efforts to communicate with his wife had been fruitless. When seen the hair on his right hand had been recently scorched off, and he was identified as having been seen in the vicinity of the building earlier in the evening.

At the trial before Justice Strang Monday afternoon he was discharged, there not being sufficient evidence to convict him. Munck testified that the store room had not been opened less than three days previous to the fire, and that he had locked it himself the last time it was opened. Watchman Clarke testified to finding a key in the room of Boone that would fit the lock in the storeroom door.

His knowledge of the location of the store room and the access to it was in a measure responsible for the arrest. The incendiary had to climb over a 10 foot fence in the rear of the building, and as the room was latched from the inside, the only way to effect an entrance was by inserting a stick and pushing the latch up. When the fire was discovered the doors were open, excepting the one in front.

Boone's story to the court was to the effect that he was in the habit of singeing his hands frequently to burn off the heavy growth of hair on his wrists. The key found in his room was an ordinary pass key that is found in most hotels, and his object for returning home was to cause a reconciliation with his wife. Boone is well known here, he moved with his family to Bandon last October, and is about 40 years old. He attempted to kill his wife shortly before he left Bandon, we are informed, and but for the timely assistance of outsiders, might have accomplished his design. When he left it was with the understanding that he would not return again.

Boone insisted on seeing some member of the family and J. Van Valkenburgh, a brother of Mrs. Boone, called to see him at the city jail, where Boone threatened to kill him if he found that he was implicated with his arrest. As soon as Boone was discharged by Justice Strang, he was arrested and put under \$500 bonds to keep the peace. At this date he has been unable to secure the necessary amount and in company of Watchman Clarke, he

was taken to the County Jail at Coquille Tuesday noon.

Paper Mill Meeting

DIRECTORS ELECTED

Will Increase Capital Stock F. J. Marshall Coming this month.

An enthusiastic meeting of the stock holders of the Pulp and Paper Mill was held in the City Hall last Saturday evening. The principal feature of the evening was the election of the Board of Directors, which is as follows:

F. J. Marshall, R. E. L. Bediillon, S. L. Cody, C. T. Blumenrother, W. D. Marshall, S. P. Bartlett. The election of the officers of the Board will take place later in this month when F. J. Marshall will be in town. He is on his way to Mexico, where he is concerned in a big paper deal, and is stopping over in Bandon to look after the paper mill interests. Following is an article taken from an Eastern paper published in his home town:

A good thing is bound to be appreciated sooner or later and to receive due recognition some time. A meritorious article can no more be downed than a city set on a hill can be hid. The force of this truth has been strikingly brought home to F. J. Marshall the past week.

Years ago, in the early days of the Marshall Paper Co., the company made many experiments in manufacturing cigarette papers. In some way, the samples made by the Marshall Paper Co. years ago must have reached the hands of these prominent manufacturers, and brought an inquiry that might have led to substantial results. Needless to say Mr. Marshall and his friends are gratified at this confirmation of their judgement of the worth of the papers they made.—Turners Falls (Mass.) Reporter.
