## Port Orford Notes.

From the Tribune.

Frank B. Tiehenor, general organizer of the Woodmen of the World, will conduct, at Kellogg, Idaho, on June 27th, a grand initiation of 300 candidates. Several bands and an immense crowd will honor the occasion, and everything possible will be done to make it pleasant and instructive.

Louis Knapp Jr., the eldest son of our hotel proprietor, had the misfortune to dislocate his wrist and break his arm a few inches above the wrist last Friday, as the result of a boyish tumble. Dr. Tyler was called and treated the injuries. Lome is a bright boy and it is too bad to be crippled when all nature is active and the fever of spring is in the boy's blood.

J. P. Russell, Ike Cox and Ed Sypher went down to Gold Beach last week on business. In coming through the green timber their wheels dropped into a bottomless pit and the horses broke both single trees in plunging to get out. As Sypher is a County Commissioner, our people are glad of their mishap, and now hope to see the road repaired before the county meets a damage suit.

## Coquille Notes.

From the Sentinel.

Attorney Thos. Hall of Marshfield who has been attending court here, has been suffering from a severe case of inflammatory rheumatism in the left foot. He gets around with much difficulty.

Married at Tonpab, Nev., on April 24th, Mr. Wilfred Gill and Miss Lillis Johnson, the latter formerly of this place, Rev. Thomas officiating. The newly married couple will make their home in Tonpab.

Carpenters commenced work Monday morning on enlarging the shelving room in H. Lorenz's store. The grocery department will be moved to the rear of the store and the shoe department will take the present place of the groceries.

The teachers of the public school are busy these days drilling the scholars for an entertainment at the close of the school, which occurs on May 21. The graduation exercises of the senior class will occur May 28 and it is expected that Hon. J. H. Ackerman, superintendent of public instruction, will be here to make an address at that time.

T. J. Little will move his rooming house to the corner occupied by the McAdams blacksmith shop. The east portion of the shop has been torn down and the remainder of the building will be moved across the street to the vacant Robinson lot. This together with the Nosler building will make a vast improvement to that end of Second street.

The management of the Coquille Mill & Mercantile Co., of this city are installing a new steam feed this week and are making preparations for the placing of a new boiler. The new machinery arrived last week and ever since Monday the crew has been making preparations for its installation.

The steam feed will increase the cutting capacity of the mill as well as make better lumber. The boiler is 60 inches x 16 feet and one of the very best manufactured. The present management of this company are wide awake business men who are progressive and acquainted with the needs of their growing business. Last fall they installed a large modern planer and also a large edger which together with the machinery just received puts their mill in first class shape.

## The Seattle Fair.

Special Correspondence: Seattle, Saturday, June 1, just two years before the opening of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, ground will be broken on the Washington University campus and work on the big world's fair commenced. The day will be marked with impressive ceremonies and will be made a memorable one in the history of the exposition. The governors and state officials of several states and the mayors of the surrounding cities will be invited to be present. Governor

Albert E. Head, of Washington, Governor George E. Chamberlain, of Oregon, Governor Gillette, of California, and several other governors are expected to make speeches. President J. E. Chilberg, of the exposition, will turn the first spadeful of earth which will mark the beginning of work on the grounds.

The executive committee has fixed the sum to be expended on beautifying the grounds and putting them into shape for building at \$380,272.10. As the work is now planned, eighty-five acres will be cleared. This will cost \$14,875. Grading will cost \$65,000 for the roads and \$40,000 for the grounds. A nursery for trees, flowers and shrubs will cost \$5,000. The water and sewerage systems will cost, respectively, \$25,550 and \$34,825. It is proposed to build 76,500 square yards of gravel, figured at \$45,900; 3,777 square yards of plank road at \$9,142.50; 22,148 square yards of service roads at \$1,429.60 and 4,250 square yards of plank walk at \$4,250.

The lighting system for the 250 acres included in the exposition grounds will cost \$14,000. Bridges over Washington Way and Union Way will be erected at a cost of \$8,500 and the subways known as the Drift and Rainier Avenue are figured at \$12,000. Railroad siding is estimated at \$5,000; the rain basin and cascades at \$3,000; tools and equipment, \$5,000; care of soil etc. \$22,500; trees, shrubbery, etc., \$25,000. A contingency allowance of \$35,000 has been set aside.

The total of \$380,272.10 will be expended exclusively on the grounds and does not include the cost of the buildings and engineering work. This money will be expended by the exposition company, none of it coming from the appropriation made by the State of Washington.

New bill to be introduced into Congress next session asking for government participation at a cost of \$1,100,000 have been prepared. The sum is divided as follows: General Government exhibit, \$200,000 for building and \$350,000 for display; Alaska, \$100,000 building and \$200,000 display; Hawaii, twenty-five thousand dollars building and seventy-five thousand display; Philippines, same as Hawaii; fisheries, fifty thousand dollars and cost of display to be paid from the three hundred and fifty thousand to defray cost of general government exhibit.
