### Bullet Makes Four Flesh Wounds in His Right Leg.

D. R. Church had a narrow escape last Saturday evening, and as it is, he will probably be very careful how he handles fire arms in the future. He was displaying his new gun, a 32 cal. Colt's Automatic, when the fire arm was discharged, the bullet making four holes in his leg, although not serious, but bad flesh wounds, and barely missing the bone.

Church was kneeling in front of his trunk, a low steamer variety, and was removing the gun from it when it was discharged. The revolver had only one charge in it, or much more damage might have resulted. It was similar to the one C. T. Allen carried. J. Van Valkenburgh went for Dr. Houston and the wounds were dressed. Mr. Church is around on crutches and will be able to resume his work on the City Hall, where he has been employed for the past week or more, in a short time.
