Coquille Notes.

From the Sentinel. Miss Lillie Way, of Myrtle Point was in Coquille the first of the week visiting friends and relatives. Miss Way expects to leave for Portland next week where she will join the Telegram party to the Jamestown Exposition, which will leave Portland about May 20th.

A quiet wedding took place Sunday evening, May 5th, at the home of the bride's mother, Mrs. G. R. Wickham, when Miss Ella R. Wickham of this city and Mr. Nels Osmondson, of Marshfield, were joined in marriage. Rev. H. M. Branham performed the ceremony.

As soon as the warehouse that A. J. Collier is erecting for F. S. Dow, the Marshfield commission man, near the depot is completed it is expected that the Standard Oil company will carry a complete stock of refined and lubricating oils at this point. This will in all probability have the effect of reducing the price very materially and will also be a great convenience to the trade.

At a special meeting of the city council held Tuesday evening, the city surveyor was instructed to make a map of the city. When this is done the names of the streets should be systemized, as at present there are three first streets and other duplications in the names of streets. The Progressive Club offers to furnish the street signs and have them nailed up if the city will have the map made and straighten out the names of the different streets.

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Sutton of Port Orford were in this city yesterday on their return home from Marshfield where they had gone to meet the body of their daughter Mrs. Ed Ashman, who died last Friday in San Francisco and which Mr. Ashman was bringing to Curry county for burial. Mrs. Ashman was a victim of consumption, having been a sufferer for about two years. Mr. and Mrs. Ashman made their home in Ashland and were on their way to southern California when the end came in San Francisco. The body will be taken to Port Orford where the funeral and burial will take place next Sunday. The deceased was born in Gold Beach in 1883 and leaves besides the husband, one child a girl four years of age.

The committee appointed to confer with Frank Morse in regard to the electric lights, reported at a special meeting of the city council that they had met Mr. Morse and that he had made them a proposition that he would increase the lights 25 per cent without additional cost to the city. He would also place in commission one more light on the corner near Judge Harlocker's residence. Mr. Morse also agrees to furnish four arc lights with an additional cost to the city of \$15 per month. The proposition of Mr. Morse was accepted by the city fathers and the new lights will be put in as soon as possible. These lights will light up a good many dark places and were much needed.

Port Orford Notes.

From the Tribune. The wireless station at Cape Blanco has been in working order for the past week and messages are successfully transmitted and received. It will take about two weeks to complete work at the station and the houses.

Isam Walker and his associate cattle buyer, Mr. Rohner, and Jesse Turner, accompanied by the former's camping outfit consisting of a four-horse wagon and five extra horses, passed through town Sunday on their way to Mr. Walker's stock ranch at Langlois; all but Mr. Turner having come from Humboldt, California.

Chester Langlois spent several days in town last week on his return from Big Bend, having resigned his position with the Gold Bar Mining Co. of that place, where he has been employed for the past year. Chester says that working through the summer months with the thermometer from 100 to 115 degrees in the shade is a little too warm for him, and he will go to Coos shortly in quest of employment.

Mart Sherrard returned from Bandon Sunday, having taken Ace and Ernest Carey to that place. The former goes to drive team for his brother

Dave, on the Coquille, while the latter is on his way to Portland, where he is contemplating starting a daily newspaper. This is young Mr. Carey's first visit to the west and he thoroughly enjoyed his few days outing in Curry and says he will return as soon as business permits.

Henry Axtell was down from Bandon the first of the week and spent a couple of nights on his homestead on Elk river. He has just opened up a new market in Bandon—dealing in vegetables, fruit, butter, dairy and ranch products, etc., and reports the beginning of a patronage which bids fair to make a success of the enterprise in that bustling little city by the sea.

Weather Report.

The nights were cooler than usual, and during the fore part of the week temperatures of 32 degrees and lower were not uncommon in the high valleys in the eastern and southern portions of the State. Light frosts occurred frequently in these districts, but they did no harm of consequence. During the daytime there was an abundance of sunshine and the afternoons everywhere averaged warmer than usual; this excess in temperature during the afternoons was most pronounced in the western counties, where the temperature averaged about eight degrees above normal in the south.

The week was practically rainless, as the only rain that fell occurred for a few hours on Friday and it was confined to the Willamette valley and southern Oregon. It was barely sufficient to lay the dust, and rain is needed in all parts of the State.
