Port Orford Notes.

With the aid of a donkey engine and a new pile-driver, the wharf has been speedily repaired so that vessels can now lie alongside of it and load or unload. As soon as piling can be had, the wharf will be extended 40 feet, which our people believe will be all that is needed, although considerably shorter than before.

Mrs. Mary Wright, wife of David A. Wright, died at her home on Sixes river, Wednesday, May 15, 1907, aged 24 years. She was the eldest daughter of Wm. Cox by his second wife, and leaves a husband and four small children, the youngest but a month old, and numerous relatives and friends to mourn her untimely death. She was buried the following Saturday at the Denmark cemetery.

Hon. R. D. Hume and nephew, J. S. Hume, accompanied by Alf Caughell and Marion Zumwalt, came up from Rogue river last week in a gasoline boat, to meet the governor and party, who desired to visit Rogue river and inspect Mr. Hume's method of propagating salmon. But fish belong to the jurisdiction of Neptune and he blew a rebellious breath that spoiled the plans. The Governor left Coos bay on a powerful tug which was to land him at Port Orford, but the storm became so violent that the tug put back to the bay, and the Governor departed thence by steamer for Portland. We all regret the failure of the plans, as the Governor is a favorite in Curry and a warm reception would have greeted him. We hope he will try again when omens are more auspicious and Neptune is asleep.

Coquille Notes.

The building on Front street formerly occupied by the Bon Ton saloon caught fire last Friday by a spark from the locomotive, but aside from a few shingles burning no damage was done.

Captain S. H. Whitney, who left for Curry county, last week, had his hand bitten by a dog in Bandon and was compelled to return to Coquille to have the hand treated, as blood poisoning had commenced to set in. The hand is much improved and he does not anticipate any harmful results from the wound.

Mrs. Lucy Holloway wife of J. W. Holloway, died at the hospital in this city last Sunday, the cause of her death being peritonitis. The deceased was about 27 years of age and had made her home in this vicinity for about three years. Mrs. Holloway was highly thought of by all who knew her and had many friends in this county. Interment took place Monday at the Masonic cemetery, Rev. Thomas of the Baptist church officiating.

W. T. Kerr received a letter from Louis Barzee, of Roseburg, Wednesday, saying that the electric road committee of his city will meet the delegates of Coos county in Marshfield with the goods, having reference to the \$120,000 that the committee raised last week. The Roseburg papers published a list of subscribers to the fund and the sums ranged all the way from \$10,000 to \$25. It was a sum that any committee could well be proud of. The meeting of Saturday will crystallize the work in this county down to a system and it will only be a few weeks before we will know for sure the outlook for an electric road from Coos Bay to Roseburg. The committee that goes from this city will consist of W. T. Kerr, J. M. Nye, T. T. Land, J. A. Lamb and L. H. Hazard. There will also be the committee from Myrtle Point and Bandon present at this meeting.
