Mr. Miller has not sold the boat, and as soon as possible will have her on the coast run and will carry freight to this and other small ports.

Whitman College of Walla Walla, Washington has developed a young amateur sprinter who recently ran 100 yards against the University of Washington, in 9 4-5 seconds. His name is William Martin, and he will probably participate in the Multnomah athletic meet in Portland the 15th inst, and there meet Dan J. San Francisco's latest troubles are the Grand Jury's indictment of her chief of police, Dunan, and also the occurrence of a rather severe earthquake. We have not as yet drawn any conclusion as to whether or not the indictment had anything to do with the quake.

### Mrs. McKinley's Death.

The death of Mrs. William McKinley marks the passing of one of the noblest couples that have ever figured in our national life. Both were perfectly fitted for the place they occupied so long. William McKinley was a rare type of the American citizen. Because of his sterling, kindly character he occupied a place in the hearts of all Americans only second to that of Abraham Lincoln. Mrs. McKinley endeared herself in the hearts of every man, woman and child, and the patient, cheerful manner in which, for thirty years, she suffered physical pain stands out as an example for emulation. Through herself and husband the carnation and the rose hold a sacred place in the hearts of all Americans today.

As a result of the new law passed at the last session of the State Legislature, which provides punishment for husbands who fail to support their families, two husbands who live in Portland have already been confronted with the law, and if convicted imprisonment is inevitable and after imprisonment comes the rockpile, for the work upon which, Multnomah County will pay \$1.50 per day to the indigent families of the respective men. One of the men has been married 21 years and is the father of 7 children, while the other has been married 19 years and is the father of 3 children, and in both instances the wives, who swore out the complaints were to the best of their ability providing for their families, including the old man. The Oregon law will not grant a divorce upon the sole grounds of non-support but it seems that the new law provides a very satisfactory substitute therefor.
