### More Railroad Rumor.

Railroad talk of course is always interesting to Coos County people and one of the latest rumors afloat among railroad circles is that the Northwestern is taking active steps to construct and continue its line to the Pacific Coast. Surveying parties representing that line have been in Boise Idaho making necessary preliminary arrangements for yardage, and depot grounds, the same agents are also making similar arrangements in Walla Walla, Wn., and it is furthermore stated that the objective point of the line is Tillamook Bay, and that railroad parties supposed to be in the employ of that line, have recently begun operations in the vicinity of that Bay.

It is generally believed that Hill and Harriman have recently entered into a new compact whereby the security of one's territory from invasion by the other is guaranteed, and if it is a fact that the Northwestern is coming to this territory it will mean a great development for Oregon, a new awakening in Railroad affairs, a decided improvement in transportation, for George Gould is one of the principals of that road and while he has at present no road to the Pacific Northwest Coast, and is not at present in a position to compete with either Hill or Harriman, in transportation he is nevertheless, financially a very formidable rival.

If the new line comes to the Western Oregon coast he will doubtless parallel the coast and Coos County will be sure to derive her share of profit.

Portland will celebrate the Fourth of July, Judge S. A. Lowell of Pendleton being the orator of the day. One of the novel features of the day will be an elaborate red fire illumination from the snow capped peaks of Mt. Hood, Mt. St Helens and Mt. Adams, all of which can be distinctly seen from Portland.

It is gratifying to note that there is one thing upon which the Portland Journal and Oregonian and Telegram are at perfect harmony i. e. knocking Seattle.

Joaquin Miller, the poet of the Sierras, has announced his intention to return to Oregon his native state and under the popular election, run for the United States senate. He is interested in mines and unlike most poets is more substantially provided with this world's goods, but we have an idea that should he attempt to run for the Senate, he might find himself a poor man even should he succeed, and therefore out of his class in the Senate. However his announcement and his prospects of success have not as yet caused Finton, Calk, Mulkey or Chamberlain, and various other candidates, any great amount of concern, over his sudden debut, and he has furthermore been referred to as Joking Miller.

It is highly gratifying to note the way with which the Myrtle Point and other Coquille Valley people are encouraging and boosting the Douglas-Coos Railway proposition. They are evidencing and exerting the kind of spirit and enterprise which is so characteristic of the West—one which is calculated to make things go.

She ventures forth as soon as the snow has sufficiently melted to permit of her getting about and for several days will eat nothing but hemlock bark and certain roots, which act as a physic. When in her normal state of health again she is ravenously hungry and will diligently fish the brooks and streams in search of a dinner of trout, will hunt up the carcasses of deer or moose which have been overcome by the severity of the winter or will prey upon porcupines by quickly putting her paw under the stomach and rolling the porcupine on its back, then with a slap tear out the entrails and escape the quills.—Field and Stream.
