Will Raise Grain.

From the first page. Illustrates that this country has a great grainraising possibility.

Two years ago Mr. Henry planted potatoes on this same land, and a neighbor seeing him at work on the piece poked fun at him and wanted to know what he expected to raise in this country. When informed that the land was expected to put forth potatoes to last for the winter, the neighbor laughed and said he would be willing to eat all of the tubers from that piece. If he had stuck to his word he would be eating potatoes yet, and would blush every time he looked a potato in the "eye."

A hill was selected in the center of the patch, and Mr. Henry and his friend examined it when the potatoes were ready to dig. The potatoes from this one hill weighed something over twenty-five pounds and individual specimens picked from the diggings would tip the scales as high as four and one half pounds each. Now that is a remarkable showing for a country that does not pretend to do anything in an agricultural pursuit.

There are ranches that have been made into orchards as soon as they were cleared and are doing as well as any of the orchards in the Valley. The next time anybody writes for information about this great country, tell them that some day we are going to raise wheat and oats and that after the land has been logged off and placed under cultivation, it will be as productive as any of their places.
