Coming This Way.

Three of the managing officials of the Wyoming, Idaho, and Pacific Railroad Company who left Chicago last Sunday night were expected here today; but they evidently failed to connect with the Branch train.

They are coming to look over this region in company with Roy L. Thatcher, to whom Ed Smith has cheerfully loaned his 60 horse power automobile for the purpose.

While the line of new road is located and surveyed, it may be changed in some localities, and these gentlemen come to look over the county cursorily, prior to the final selection of the route.

The Wyoming, Idaho and Pacific Railroad is to run from Chicago to Coos Bay, and to be 1852 miles in length. It will enter Idaho near Jackson's Hole, run down the Snake to Idaho Falls, thence to Arco on nearly a straight line, to Carey, to Picabo, along the old emigrant road to Camas Prairie, and on to Boise, where the terminus will be near the Natatorium.

It will drop a line to Salt Lake from Wyoming, one to the same place from Idaho, probably one to Hailey, and down to the Alberta and Twin Falls tracts.

Construction gangs will be put to work from Salt Lake to connect with the Idaho line, while gangs will work both ways from the Utah and Northern Railroad. Another crew will be put on from the Coos Bay end, and no expense will be spared to open the line for traffic as early a date as possible. It is expected to reach Picabo next year and to be running to Coos Bay within two years.

The company has \$135,000,000 underwritten, and it is believed to be an auxiliary of the Northwestern—Wood River Times.

Had it paid in Currency.

It was paper money that awakened suspicion and gave the first clue to the hoodlums in San Francisco. The bankers were for a long time at their wits' end to understand why so many calls were made upon them for currency, for San Francisco has always been a gold city. When Boss Ruoff bargained for a bribe his order was "Bring me currency." He wanted no jingling, no rattling of coin. His confessed bribes amounted to about \$1,000,000 during the past year. The boodle in the trolley deal was \$400,000 this was paid in two payments, each of \$200,000. The banks had to be raked to get the amount, and much of it had to be in big bundles of bills of small denomination. With this for a clue Francis J. Heney and Secret Service Agent William J. Burns ran the thing down.

Mayor Schmitz was not particular about the kind of money he received. He had a box set in the floor under his bed and had it padded with plush so that the sound of coin would be deadened, but he grew so careless at last that when he removed to his new house on Vallejo street he forgot about it, and detective Burns found it, in the old Fillmore street house. But he never had as much use for it, for Ruoff was the collector, and always had the money delivered in currency. There is no sympathy due Schmitz, but will be lasting regret to thousands who never saw either of the men if Schmitz is punished, and Ruoff, because of having turned sneak and informer, escapes punishment. Schmitz doubtless deserves all he will get, but what Ruoff deserves is hanging, not the expeditious work of breaking his neck but such a climax as the men of California gave to a horse-thief when they mounted him on horseback, with a rope from his neck to a tree and then led the horse out from under him.—Salt Lake Telegram.

An "Inch" of Rain.

Few people have an adequate idea of the amount of water that descends from the clouds during a rainstorm. We read in the weather bulletins

that two or three inches of rain sometimes falls in a day, and that in our last rainy spell nearly five inches fell in forty-eight hours; but these figures really convey very little information to our minds, and give us no idea at all of the prodigality of nature.

An acre contains 6,272,640 square inches of surface, and an inch of rain means, therefore, the same number of cubic inches of water. A gallon contains 277.27 cubic inches of water, and an inch of rainfall means 22,622 gallons to the acre, and, as a gallon of water weighs ten pounds, the rainfall on an acre is 226,220 pounds. Counting 2,000 pounds to the ton, an inch of rain means over 113 tons per acre. An acre is about half a St. Louis block, so that a rainfall of an inch means a downpour of about 226 tons of water on every city block. Multiply this by five, the number of inches of rainfall during the wet spell in the last week in May, and no one can wonder that the gutters were insufficient to carry off the water. The occasional overflow of a sewer in the lower part of town is regarded as a very remarkable thing, but the wonder really is that there is not an overflow every time it rains.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

Street Fair and Carnival at Tillamook.

The Tillamookers are going to have another Carnival and Fair there this year. The boosters of that enterprising city by the sea are working night and day to make this better and bigger than the one they had last year, and to accomplish this, they will have to go some. The Fair will last three days, commencing August 22nd. Editor R. Watson of the Herald is one of the principal agitators and he is devoting his sheet and time for the success of the project.

Tillamook, like our little town, has a great future. It is not connected by railroads with the outside, and the only way possible to get into Tillamook is either by boat, service of which is very uncertain in the winter time, or by stage, the lesser of the two evils being hard to determine by travelers. The P. R. & N. is building into that territory, and in another year will have the two ends connected. In order to save time, they are building from both ends.

A large number of Portlanders are expected to participate in the event, and here's to the success of the show.
