Secretary Taft's visit to Oregon is attracting state wide attention. All will be welcome to hear his address at the Armory, Friday evening, September 6th, at 8 o'clock P. M. where there is room for 6,000 people. His audience promises to be the largest in recent years.

The law in question states plainly that all children between the ages of 9 to 14 must attend school hereafter, or have a good reason for not doing so. Failure will mean all manner of fines and possibly imprisonment for somebody. It is a new law and one of the strictest ever passed by any legislature in any of the states. The children who are allowed to stay out of school will come out of the trouble much easier than the parents, for should they be found guilty of allowing their children to miss school they can be fined under the new law \$20 to \$100 or imprisonment for 100 days.—News.
