### Myrtle Point Notes.

From the Enterprise.

A youngster was told to soak his feet in a tub of salt water if he wished to toughen them. He soaked his hands too. "Its pretty near time for me to git a licking," he explained. "Tomorrow I'm going to sit in it."

Mr. F. B. Tichenor, who has been visiting Coos and Curry county friends for some time, left Thursday morning for Marshfield where he will take the Breakwater for Portland on his way home to Spokane, Wash.

Peaches, watermelons and muskmelons from Douglas county are quite plentiful on the Myrtle Point market. These luxuries are being brought in by team and are proving a source of profit to both the growers and the teamsters.

The annual reunion of the Latter Day Saints which has been held at the Dixon grove during ten days, closed Sunday. The meetings were very interesting and successful. A number of ministers from various localities were present and quite a number of visitors from other places attended the services.

V. Foss, a lumberman in the Mullen logging camp on the North Fork, was crushed by a log that rolled over him Monday evening. He was badly bruised, his left side was hurt, and there are indications of slight injury to his right lung; but his doctor hopes, if no unfavorable symptoms set in, to have him around again in a short time. No one was present to witness the accident, but Mr. Foss has been able to describe it in part, and it is considered very fortunate that he received no more serious injury.

Levi Smith brought in a female panther Thursday morning that had been killed by his son Ed, and Chas. Epperson. The carcass was bought by Walter Endicott, and will be mounted by Jack Abbott. The brute was treed by dogs and shot after dark Wednesday. The varmint's range has been in a section of country about six miles out of town where she had gathered in about twenty-five head of sheep in the past few days, which accounts for her fat and healthy condition. It is thought that she has a mate on the same range and an effort will be made to get him also.

### Port Orford Notes.

In a horse-shoe pitching contest at Wedderburn last week between Mathews of Gold Beach and Meek of Wedderburn, for 100 points, the latter won by a safe margin—considerable money changing hands on the results.

The measles having exhausted themselves in Port Orford, have passed on down the coast, where Fromms, Whites and Sherrards are fighting with them. Though many have had them seriously, yet there has been no fatal cases.

Another party of S. P. surveyors have joined Brown's surveyors and are now camped at Fromm's. There are now over forty people in the two parties. In any other business we would expect results to follow such expensive moves, but no one can tell what an R. R. Company will do.

Congressman Hawley will leave Drain for Coos bay Sept. 2nd; will be in Bandon Sept. 4th, and in Dairyville and Port Orford the next day or the following day. We are as yet unable to announce the definite date when he will be here, but we hope that everyone interested in Port Orford will turn out to greet him. It will try to be arranged for him to speak at 2 o'clock so that ranchers will have time to return home. There will be a dance in the evening at Nielson's hall.

### Apples and Brains.

The New York "Apple King," who expresses his willingness to pay \$10,000 for a 10-acre apple orchard six miles from Ashland, gives strong testimony as to the opportu-

ties for development of this industry in Oregon. The land upon which this orchard was planted was worth \$50 to \$100 an acre when used as a grain or hay field. To plant the trees and bring them to maturity may have cost \$100 an acre in excess of revenue that could be had from the land while the trees were growing. The difference represents the intelligence, care and skill in selecting and caring for the trees.

Mr. White gives no description of the orchard he considers the best west of the Rocky Mountains and it is impossible to point out just how the grower has managed to produce an orchard of such value. But while it is impossible to tell how he did it, it is easy to tell some of the ways in which he didn't do it. He didn't take any old tree an irresponsible nurseryman wanted to get off his hands. He didn't set out a dozen different varieties of trees upon the theory that if one variety failed he would get a crop from the others. He didn't set the trees so close together that they couldn't develop a top or a root system without inter-lacing. He didn't give the San Jose scale full liberty the first few years upon the theory that it would be time to spray when the trees began to bear. He didn't turn the orchard over to a tree-butcher to trim and prune. He didn't let his trees become unbalanced so that limbs on one side would break off while the other side had nothing to break. He didn't rely upon nature to do anything for him that he could do for himself. His apple orchard worth \$1000 an acre in the open market and worth \$1400 an acre to him, represents an investment of perhaps \$200 an acre in money and labor. The rest of the value was the product of brains.—Portland Oregonian.
