Hoquiam.—The O'Donnell and Sandstrom Shipbuilding Company has received a contract for the construction of a steam schooner for E. S. Estabrook of San Francisco, the cost to be, when completed, \$95,000. The vessel will be 186 feet over all, 40 foot beam and 11 feet depth of hold, twin screw, with shallow draft for use between San Francisco and Coquille river. This schooner will take the place of the Fiefield, which was recently destroyed by fire at Bandon, Or., and will be known by the same name. The machinery will be shipped from San Francisco and will be installed here.
