

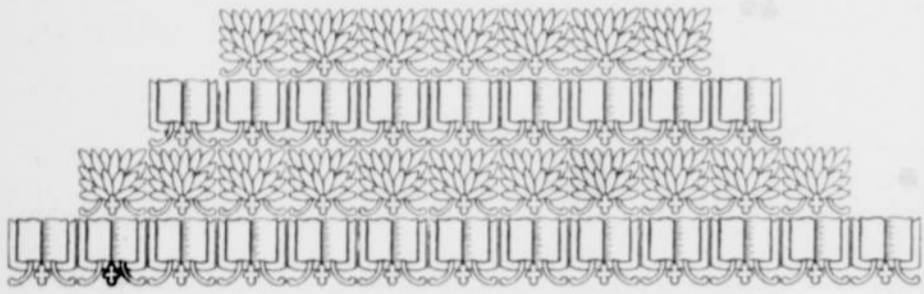

Miss Palmer is a society girl of independent fortune and high place. She has been a belle in Bar Harbor and Newport for several years. But more recently she took her celebrated beauty to Paris, whence she returned on the Lorraine yesterday to start quite the most astounding innovation in dress—or the lack of it—that the most blasé New Yorkers have ever seen.

Harry Walker, a member of the life-saving crew at Bandon, took a vacation at Coquille the first of the week. He tells us that A. T. Fetter, formerly publisher of the RECORDER but now of San Francisco, thinks seriously of returning to Bandon and re-entering the newspaper field. Mr. Fetter will be remembered as the able and hustling journalist who issued so creditable a special edition 14 months ago.

W. H. Norval, Superintendent of the Riverton Lumber Company's plant, who was in town Tuesday evening, informs us that the mill with the exception of the planer, was closed down Saturday evening for a period of a week or ten days. This was owing to the congested state of the yards, rendering a shutdown necessary until some of the lumber could be shipped away.

Hark Dunham was again sporting the badge of a deputy marshal last Sunday. Marshal Goodman being away for a day's recreation. The little one was brought to town and given medical treatment, but the fracture is reported to be a severe one.

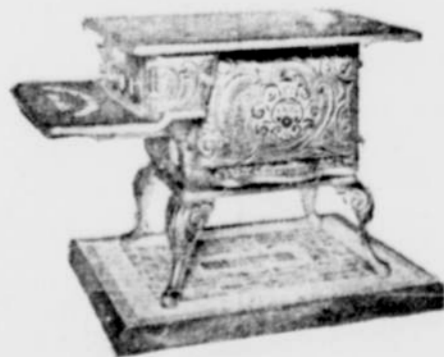
