



## CANNING SEASON OPENS THIS WEEK

BOTH CANNERIES RUNNING FULL BLAST

Catch Reported Very Good  
Bullards gets 500 in  
One Seine.

The canning season is now on, running at full blast. Both the canneries at Bandon and Prosper have their full force at work and the present indications of the run at this stage of the season, seems to signify a larger run than has been experienced for several years.

The Timmons Cannery here in Bandon commenced to receive fish on Tuesday morning. A few were brought in, just enough to give things a good start. On Wednesday morning the catches were larger and today things are on the hum. Something over 500 fish were brought in yesterday morning. Mr. Timmons tells us he has an efficient force to handle the catch this season and there is little danger of having to refuse any of the fish. One of the fishing boats alone brought in a catch of 100.

The Prosper Canning Company commenced receiving Monday and they report a good run. They have plenty of help and the work has commenced without any delay. They report a larger number of fish than the local cannery, to date. On Wednesday morning they received fifteen hundred; mostly silversides.

R. W. Bullard brought in five hundred salmon which he had caught in one seine, and which is considered very good this time of the year. Floyd Barkelow and Nelson Brown who are fishing near Prosper, caught their net on a snag and lost a portion of it Tuesday night.

So far the Chinook Salmon have been extremely scarce, so much so that it hardly pays to can them separately. Their numbers will undoubtedly increase as the season advances.

### A Collision and an Apology.

## THE BANDON TRUST AND SAVINGS BANK INCORPORATED JULY 1, 1907.

M. C. HORTON, WM. GRIMES AND HENRY SENGSTACKEN ARE THE INCORPORATORS

Articles of Incorporation Have Been Filed with F. W. Benson, Secretary of State - New Company Capitalized for \$25,000.00

It has been commonly thought that a new banking company, known as The Bandon Trust and Savings Corporation, has been organized for some time, but faint rumors could not give any definite satisfaction as to the reliability of such information. But this week we learn positively that such a corporation has been organized, and since the location for a building has been purchased, they will no doubt do something in the very near future toward building.

The corporation was organized on July 1, 1907, and the articles of incorporation have been filed with Secretary of State, F. W. Benson. The authorized capital stock is \$25,000, and the incorporators are M. C. Horton, Wm. Grimes and Henry Sengstacken. The articles of incorporation were filed August 16, 1907. Inquiry of the State Bank Examiner does not show that the bank has been granted a certificate to transact a banking business in the State of Oregon as provided by an

act to define a bank and banking business. The officers of the corporation are not yet known.

The two former incorporators are not known in Bandon, but Mr. Sengstacken is well known all over the county.

Some time ago the "flat-iron" building changed hands, Judge Topping transacting the business. At that time it was not stated who the purchasers were, but it was thought to be some person interested in the banking business, as this is the best site for that purpose in Bandon. The building is now occupied by Chas. Daily, who holds a lease that will not expire for eighteen months yet.

Whether a new banking company in town will pay remains to be seen. We are growing and all branches of business are being increased. It stands to reason, however, if we continue to prosper here, and there is no reason why we should not, that there will be room for another such institution.

## CITY COUNCIL MET LAST FRIDAY NIGHT

COLUMBIA AVENUE WILL BE OPENED UP

Gambrinus Brewing Co. is  
Granted Retail Liquor License

A special meeting of the city council was called for last Friday night, and several important matters were decided, among which was the decision regarding Columbia avenue and the granting of a license to the Gambrinus Brewing Co. for the purpose of retailing liquor in any quantity.

Work on Columbia avenue has progressed to such an extent that it was deemed advisable to lay the remonstrance on the table and continue with the work as originally intended. This will open up that street full width and provide for a grade which was lately established by the city engineer. The improvement will add greatly to the valuation of the property, and it was only a question of time when the work would have to be done anyway. Several property owners have already graded the required amount according to specifications.

Recorder C. R. Wade presented a table of the revised assessment of the property holders on Atwater street, for approval, which was adopted and ordered drafted into an ordinance to that effect, and the table filed with the treasurer for the collection of such assessments.

After granting a license to Robert Marsden, of the Gambrinus Brewing Depot of this place, for the purpose of retailing malt and spirituous liquors in quantities less than one gallon, the meeting was adjourned.
