Eugene, September 25, 1907.

The University of Oregon opened its doors Tuesday, Sept. 24th. The first and second days' registration has shown an increase of more than twenty per cent over the registration of the same time last year. Almost every high school and academy in the state is represented, and a large number are presenting credentials from eastern preparatory schools. The year will mark the highest point in enrollment that the University has yet reached. The very serious question that is presenting itself, is, how to take care of all students. The lack of funds has made it impossible to furnish and heat all of the rooms in the library building, and for the same reason, the girl's new dormitory will have to lie idle for the year. Students, however, are adjusting themselves readily to the conditions, and the outlook for the year's work is exceptionally good.
