When he lived near Empire, he was accustomed to furnish the people with game and the people went to him when they wished something in that line. Mrs. Henry Sengstacken, who is well acquainted with his late history, speaks of him as an Indian of much finer qualities than the ordinary red man. Among his better sentiments was a great regard for his wife for whom he always had the tenderest feelings and whom he cared for till the last. His end was seen to be approaching last Monday and Mrs. Sengstacken visited the home that day. Tom had practically ceased to realize what was occurring about him, but he roused and made a request for Mrs. Sengstacken to look after his wife.
