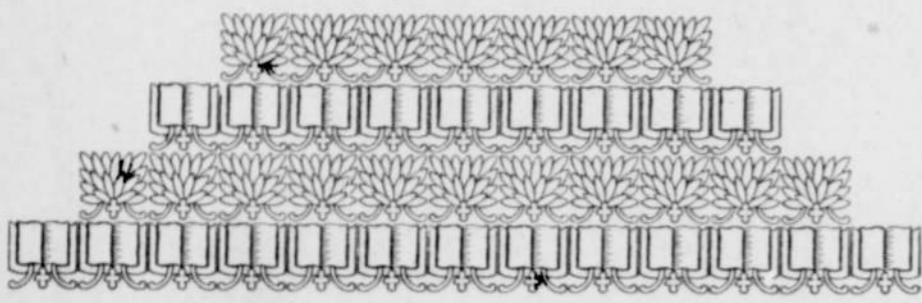

The Fleet and the War Scare.

When the United States opened the door of Japan and let foreign nations in and brought Japan out, it could not have been imagined that Japan would ever become an important member of the family of nations, certainly not so soon, or that there would be talk of rivalry within fifty years between the United States and Japan, and possible war.

There is possibility of rivalry, it may be admitted; of war, too, but it is not now comprehensible. Japan, as the leader in the Orient, will surely make the conditions of a commercial rivalry with the United States. But can any one see war on that horizon? The New York Sun affects to see it. Others may. But the office of prophecy is easily assumed. If it tells the truth, then "I told you so." If the thing doesn't come to pass, the prophecy is quickly forgotten.

Is it worth while to hearken to such utterances as those of the Sun? At least they afford matter for curiosity. That journal assumes that the dispatch of the fleet to the Pacific is likely to create "a condition requiring war for its solution." Then "the people will have no volition in the matter. They will have to go to war anyhow."

Is it to be expected, then, that Japan, finding American war vessels in the Pacific, will take their presence as a challenge, and declare war on the United States? Is it, then, true, that if we show warlike strength we shall provoke attack, and that our best security is to be without arms?

There will be industrial and commercial rivalry between the United States and Japan. But never so great as that which exists between the United States and Great Britain.

The United States pushed the Pacific railroads to completion that it might be prepared to defend its interests on the Pacific. Was this a challenge of war? The United States has undertaken the Panama Canal for the same purpose. Is this a challenge of war?

But admit there is some danger that Japan may, on frivolous pretexts, based on such as those trifling incidents at San Francisco, assume high tone towards the United States, threaten war, and even declare it! Japan probably will not. Her ambitious megalomania, or swelled head, is not likely to reach that stage. But suppose it should? The fleet then would not be out of its proper place in the Pacific. Then there would be occasion to bless "the providence that's watchful in a state." If it be admitted that there is some uneasiness and some reason for it, then all the more reason why the fleet should come to the Pacific.—Oregonian.

One incident worthy of note was the fact that it was the first wedding to be solemnized in the new Methodist edifice of the county's metropolis.

There will be a special school meeting in this city Saturday, Oct. 26, at 3:30 for the purpose of voting a special tax within the district for the purpose of conducting the school for a term of nine months. In conversation the Senator said that he expected that there would be a special river and harbor bill at this session of Congress, though usually the custom is only to have this bill come up in every two years. Mr. Fulton is sanguine in regard to his re-election to the Senate.
