ISSUES BONDS ON THE PANAMA CANAL

WILL RELIEVE THE FINANCIAL SITUATION Will be Circulated Among National Banks over the Country

A dispatch from New York, Nov. 18th, says:

Satisfaction was general today in banking circles because of the government's plan of relief to the market by the issue of \$50,000,000 in Panama bonds and \$100,000,000 in one year treasury certificates.

So strong was this feeling that it was understood that gold engagements would practically cease after today. International bankers declared that the gold already engaged is as much as New York can justly take from Europe under the strained conditions which prevail there.

500 PILING WILL DEEPEN CHANNEL

WORK WOULD COST LESS THAN \$1000 Current Would Keep the Channel Free From the Shoals.

Local engineers and men who have experience in river work give their opinions regarding the course to pursue improvements in the river at Bandon. The subject is one that every business man and all of the mill men along the river should consider.

The lagoon fills with water at high tide and stops the swiftness of the river. This accounts for the sand spit on the north river bank. Boats have to remain in the harbor for several days at a time, on account of periodical shoals in the river near the mouth.

The cost will be considerably less than \$1000, and will be money well spent. Other harbors along the coast are raising money for improvement without the assistance of the government.
