CONTRACT FIXES COMPLETION APRIL 1.

J. R. Green of San Francisco to be Owner and Manager.

The Bandon Creamery will be the name of a plant to be built at once in this city, and to be completed by April 1st, 1908.

J. R. Green, of San Francisco, will be the owner and move to Bandon permanently to take charge and management of the plant.

Mr. Green was in Bandon last November looking over the prospects for such a plant, and was fully satisfied with the outlook. He has been in Bandon during the last week, and stated to the RECORDER that he has secured a lot on the water front East of Lumber Street, which will better be described as being about 80 feet East of the Walsstrom warehouse. A contract for the construction of the plant has already been made with R. H. Rosa, and the building will be completed by April 1st, 1908, and the machinery for the plant will be on the ground by March 15th and installed at once.

Montgomery vs. Patton.

The following is an excerpt from the Telegram of the 9th instant:

That William Patton took five people to Douglas county and located them on the same timber claim was part of the testimony given by Mrs. Fannie L. Montgomery before Judge Gantenbein in the State Circuit Court this morning, at the trial of Patton on the charge of embezzling \$7. Mrs. Montgomery testified that she went to Roseburg with Patton to locate a timber claim, and that Patton had told her she need not go to the claim, and consequently she made her filing without inspecting the claim. When she boarded the train at Portland, she said, she gave Patton her purse, which contained \$21, fearing she might be robbed. She said Patton spent \$13 of the money for her, and gave back the purse with only 70 cents. The witness gave him various sums of money at different times to apply on the fee of \$250 for locating her on the timber claim. After returning from Roseburg Mrs. Montgomery learned from others that Patton had taken five people and located them on the same claim. She then was convinced that she was being defrauded, she said. Further testimony is being offered this afternoon.

Mrs. Montgomery was in Bandon last spring, and is known by many people here.

MORE BANDON IMPROVEMENTS

NEW BUILDINGS, STREETS AND WALKS

To be Constructed at Once--Town Officials are Busy.

Girls' Basket Ball Game and Debates Held in Bandon.

It all the improvements proposed and undertaken by the Town dads be carried out before they retire from office things will be humming pretty lively next Spring.

Columbia Avenue will be opened up and completed to the Racetrack, Little Street or Pacific Avenue just west and parallel to Columbia, will be graded to Sixth, and one or two cross streets will be opened. Atwater Street from the Shingle Mill will be planked to Columbia unless there be remonstrances against the same.

Homer Street from the Rosa Store to the Wharf will be planked for the full width, and sidewalked.

Numerous Streets on the hill will be sidewalked, an Ordinance having recently been passed to that effect, pursuant to the intention to do so, as advertised last July, and now the latest undertaking, unless remonstrances prevent, is to extend First Street beyond the City Hall to meet Spruce Street, and then plank Spruce Street Southward, which will require that streetway to be extended to and slightly beyond the R. R. track used in the Government work, and thereafter the road around the foot of the hill, which is only a County road will be vacated, and doubtless revert to adjacent property owners.

The City charter will come before the people for adoption or rejection in all probability some time during March.

The Village of Bandon is daily being transformed into a City.

The business section of Bandon, will, in a few days, take on a very brisk and lively appearance in the way of building, especially on Homer Street, where Arthur Ellingson has already commenced the construction of a two-story building directly at the end of First Street, and work is well under way; almost adjoining, the Knights of Pythias will at once commence the construction of a three story temple. Beyond the Woolen Mill will be the new creamery. Homer Street will be replanked for the full width, and sidewalked. Lumber Street is the first street beyond the Woolen Mill, and this street, we are informed, will be planked over to the water front at once, the work to begin as soon as possible. This improvement will add very much to the Bandon business district.

A basket ball team of girls and a debating team from Coquille will visit Bandon in the early part of February, and here meet similar teams who will defend the honor of their own school, while a boy's basket ball team, and an orator from here, will about the same time invade the territory of the County Seat Town looking for scalps and a wampum.

These interscholastic events are quite common throughout the United States, and are looked forward to by both young and old, as some of the principal happenings of the year, for it is the battle and struggle for victory that makes both brain and brawn the more masterful and formidable.

We learn that negotiations have been under way with all the schools of the County to unite into a County league for such contests, and the outcome has not been at all flattering, and the schools of Bandon and Coquille determined to go ahead anyway.

Every pupil in the local High School is entered in the oratorical try-out. The debating team has already been selected, and have submitted to Coquille, some phase of the Ship subsidy question. The basket ball teams of both boys and girls are practising hard for the coming event.

The Bandon "grown-ups" can greatly encourage the home teams by turning out and incidentally showing public spirit.

AMERICAN-JAP CONTROVERSY UNSETTLED

Fleet at Rio Janeiro--Pacific Coast Fortifications.

A political campaign is now on in Japan, and one of the principal issues is America and her attitude upon the emigration question. The Washington Government does not wish to force or join issue with the Japanese Government before the termination of her campaign, but a Washington dispatch to the Oregonian states that new coast defenses are being installed and old ones re-enforced at Pacific Coast point, Guam, Hawaii and Manila. This work of fortification is being carried forward swiftly and upon a gigantic scale. Coal depots are being replenished, huge searchlights installed, harbors mined, big guns placed and ammunition magazines filled to overflowing.

So quietly has this work been going on that few outside of the officials handling the work have realized the enormous undertaking under way. This work was started last May and it is expected that a year will see the completion of the programme.

The American Battle ship fleet which is on the way to Frisco has covered about 4600 miles or one third of the way, and is anchored at Rio De Janeiro. The journey so far has been unmarred by even the slightest accident.
