**SALOON LICENSE IS RAISED TO \$600**

**Midnight Closing Ordered.—  
Chinese Hop Joint

The Marshfield City Dads last Monday night passed new ordinances providing that all saloon licenses in that City shall be raised from \$100 to \$600 per year, and that all saloons be closed at midnight, with a further provision that all licenses will begin and expire at the same time each year; hereafter, similar to the Federal provision regulating licenses. The ordinance will take effect in thirty days.

**PLOT TO DESTROY ADMIRAL EYBORG'S FLEET**

**Idaho Bank Closes its Doors.  
Suspension is Only  
Temporary.**

A maliciously false rumor recently spread the length and breadth of the United States, that an attempt has been made by five Italians and one Canadian to blow up one or all of the vessels of the American fleet anchored at Rio De Janerio. Such rumor proved to be absolutely false. The immense white vessels are swinging idly at anchor in the bay and have been joined by the torpedo boat flotilla of six vessels, and in the brilliant light of the tropic sun, in perfect weather conditions, the sight is imposing.

The fleet is the largest that has ever assembled in South America, and the event is being celebrated by the Brazilians including the highest society of the city.

The Capital State Bank of Boise, Idaho failed to open its doors on the 21st, the suspension being caused by the heavy withdrawal of deposits. Directors declare the suspension to be temporary.

The State Democratic Central Committee has appointed June 16th next as the date upon which the State Convention shall be held for the purpose of selecting eight delegates and as many alternates to represent the State at the Denver National Convention to be held July 7th. The Committee agreed that it would be proper for the four presidential electors to be selected by the voters directly at the primaries, April 17th, and that such electors be endorsed by the Convention. According to the apportionment of the delegates among the respective counties, Coos County is entitled to five delegates to the State Convention.

Upon last Thursday evening, Mesdames Topping and Kausrud entertained the members of the Concert Band and their wives and lady friends at Concrete Hall, with a banquet and a program. C. R. Wade presided as toast master, and many interesting and laughable toasts were given and responded to. One causing some merriment was: "Hark not to Dunham's distant threat, through the lonely Sentinel up the dell; and let us ever strive to forget the Eagles nesting at Coquille." The band rendered a very pretty program, and not until midnight did the party break up.

On Saturday night, the 25th inst., Court Queen, the local lodge of the Foresters of America, will entertain their friends and brother foresters at the Bank Hall, with the annual Grand Ball given by that lodge. Numerous committees have been appointed and have the work well under way, the event has been widely advertised, and will be largely attended. The Seaside Orchestra will furnish the music for the occasion, and the dance will last for the greater part of the night.

**BIG IMMIGRATION  
TO BEAVER STATE**

**NUMBER REACHED 27,215 DURING 1907**

**Prediction Made That It Will  
be Doubled in the  
Present Year.**

The influx of Eastern people to Oregon during 1907 reached the record breaking number of 27,215 people within the actual knowledge of The Oregon Development League, which large number is almost without parallel in the history of immigration in the Northwest, and which was brought about by the cooperation of commercial bodies, newspapers and colonists excursion rates. This immigration was an increase of over a 100 per cent over that of 1906, and beginning with the colonist rates to commence March 1st, we may, upon conservative estimate, expect no less than 50,000 new people to locate in Oregon within the next 10 months.
