GOOD Short Stories

HE FEARS RUSSIAN POLICE.

As Esallo, Vasil Kotoff, Decides That They Will Find Him.

While the student riots were in progress in Warsaw, Poland, last year, a young man rode a horse at the head of one of the processions of rebellious subjects, says the Kansas City Times. He carried a Polish flag and made a speech to the crowd denouncing the czar for his oppression of the Polish people. He was Vasil Kotoff, a member of a noble Polish family.

The same young man pushed a truck in one of the Kansas City packing houses yesterday. He is an exile from his native land, but glad to be alive. Last night he gave up his place to seek a place in the far west in an effort to hide his identity. He fears that the Russian police may try to find him and take him back to Russia.

Kotoff speaks the Polish, German, Russian and Jewish languages, but very little English. Through Dr. George L. Alex. Hamilton, a Russian physician, he told the story of his escape from Poland recently.

"Those of us who were to speak in Warsaw were selected by lot," he said. "We were mounted on horses. I carried a flag. We were all arrested on a charge of 'treason' because we said the czar should keep his promise and give Poland an assembly."

"With two others I escaped from prison. We spent two weeks in a wheat field, living on grain and fruit. After almost starving we reached Germany. In order to cross the border out of Russia we walked into the sea at night until our heads were just above the water. Thus we avoided the guard. At a German seaport town we arranged passage on a ship for Mexico. There we parted."

"I went to San Antonio, Tex., where I worked in a mill. I made my way to Kansas City by riding the trucks."

"I do not know that I am being followed, but I may be and I want to go west so no one will know me. I came to America to live and when I learn the language I can earn plenty of money, but until then it means hard work."

"What would have been your punishment?" he was asked.

"Death, or perhaps if I had friends, a life sentence in a Siberian prison, chained to a truck which I would have been compelled to push all day."
