SALUTATORY.

The patrons of the RECORDER were apprised last week of a change in the ownership of this paper. They know that Mr. Irving S. Scotton in the capacity of editor.

The steamer Bandon left the Coquille river Friday with a small cargo of lumber for Kruse & Banks, shipbuilders on Coos Bay. This may seem to some a peculiar proceeding and yet, when it is considered that the vast preponderance of the timber wealth of Coos county is in the valley and not on the bay, and that the Simpson and Dean mills are at-

ting legs brought over the S. P. stub line from the river, being taken from Cedar Point and other places above, and when it is also carried in mind that the charges of the said railroad are away in excess of what timber and lumber can be transported for by water, the wonder is that Coos Bay does not supply herself more by such shipments and leave the S. P. entirely out of the deal.

District Fair at Marshfield

The Coos Bay spirit was dominant at last night's meeting of the chamber of commerce, says Saturday's Times. The atmosphere was vibrant with it. It was voted in the enthusiastic talks of C. A. Howard and F. P. Norton, in the eloquent and stirring address of Francis H. Clark, in the animated music of the band and the militant measures of Captain Magenn's patriotic poem, "The Coming of the Fleet."

The enthusiasm for the district fair which was kindled at the meeting the evening before was communicated to last night's assemblage. There was nothing but words of praise and promise for the proposed exhibition. Mr. Clark's earnest and inspiring words found a ready response in the hearts of his auditors, as evinced by the warmth of their endorsement. Rarely is there such a harmonious combination of eloquence and practical suggestion as finds a place in the felicitous phrase with which Mr. Clark voices his faith in an appreciation of the resources and advantages of Coos Bay.

As a result of conference the president, Dr. McCormac, announced the following committee from various parts of Coos county to enter on the preliminary preparations for the fair: Marshfield—A. H. Powers, P. P. Norton. North Bend—L. J. Simpson. Coquille—A. J. Sherwood. Myrtle Point—W. B. Pike. Bandon—Stephen Gallier. Curry County—R. D. Hume. Work will be inaugurated to make the coming district fair one of the best ever held in southern Oregon.

Lid On at North Bend.

The following bit of interesting news is culled from the Coos Bay Times of Saturday:

North Bend will put on a chilled steel lid riveted with red-hot steel bolts. This action was taken at a council meeting last week and before a chamber crowded with interested citizens. Such drastic action was not anticipated, but roll-call disclosed that the vote was unanimous.

A death blow was dealt the dance hall on Washington avenue in North Bend, owned by J. C. Wilcox, by the council when it passed a resolution condemning the resort as a public nuisance and a detriment to the welfare of the city, giving the proprietor until May 1 to close.

At the same meeting the safoin ordinance was unanimously passed providing for the closing up of the saloons at midnight on week days and from midnight Saturday until 5 o'clock Monday morning.

The full council was out and the "tightening" process was performed before an audience that packed the city hall to its capacity. Both the resolution and ordinance were passed unanimously.

After one year's trial handling White House Queen Band Blue Ribbon shoes Bandon, the R. H. Rosa Co. have found them satisfactory, and have just added a spring line of low cuts for men, women and children.

Shipwreck Up at Tillamook.

A dreadful marine disaster happened on the coast of Tillamook county, south of the Columbia river, a week ago, its cause being somewhat mysterious in view of the absence of thick weather. A dispatch from Bay City, dated Feb. 15th, thus speaks of the affair:

Captain Kessel, of the wrecked ship Emily Reed, which was lost early yesterday morning on the Tillamook coast, near the Nehalem river, has returned to the scene of the wreck to ascertain if it is possible to save any of the cargo. Eleven of the crew were drowned. The Emily Reed was en route from New Castle, New South Wales, to Portland loaded with coal.
