### Myrtle Point Notes

Lalice, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. N. Harry, of Brewster Valley, was so badly burned last Monday morning at 9:30 that she died 36 hours later, Tuesday night at 11 o'clock, and the funeral was held Thursday afternoon, interment being in the cemetery at Dora.

James McConachie, who entered the city hospital at Myrtle Point on the 6th from Riverton, has been very ill with migraine. Dr. Wetmore reports his condition somewhat improved.

At the meeting of the commissioners of the Southern Oregon District Fair Association held in Roseburg last week, the coming fair was voted to be held in Marshfield, the Bay city receiving five votes and Eugene three. R. C. Dement and John Bear, the two Coos county commissioners, were represented by proxy. The people of Coos county will be pleased that the fair is to be held here this fall, and all will undoubtedly do what they can to make the exhibition a credit to this section.

Dr. J. W. Strange, until his last illness editor of the Spokesman at Roseburg, passed away at his home in that city last Sunday morning after a three weeks' illness from dropsy, being 55 years old. Dr. Strange was well known in Myrtle Point and vicinity, having practiced his profession of dentistry here for about three years previous to his removal to Roseburg, and his friends will be sorry to learn of his death. Dr. Strange was quite prominent in politics, having served a term as school superintendent of Douglas county in the 80's. He was also reading clerk of the Oregon legislature and chief clerk of the senate. He was a member of the A. O. U. W., W. O. W. and I. O. O. F.

The alleged timber land fraud cases from Curry county will be heard at the April term of the federal court in Portland. The parties interested are Richard D. Jones, William H. Smith, Jacob C. Cross, David M. Goodwin, Will D. Gould, Frank A. Stewart, Wm. T. Kerr, John R. Miller, Fred W. Dennis, Richard Hynes, M. M. Riley, Lee R. Myers, George L. Stearns, Jeremiah Huntley, Ames S. Johnston, Warren Gillelen, R. W. Kenny, A. H. Hedderly, John Doe, Richard Roe and Thomas Roe; conspiracy under section 5440. Proceedings are pending for the removal of a number of these defendants from California to Oregon for trial. The transactions arise from the old Pacific Furniture and Lumber company, which had a mill at Port Orford. W. T. Kerr of this city was manager of the company.
