John McVay, Jr., and wife of Smith River, were passengers on this morning's stage for Coquille, where they expect to reside in the future.

A petition was circulated in town last week for the purpose of submitting the question, "Shall the precinct remain dry?" and received enough signatures to order an election.

Married—In San Francisco Jan. 30th, by Rev. Bell, Hugh C. Hampton of Louisville, Kentucky, and Harriette Haines of Eckley, Ore. The bride is a daughter of Joseph Haines and wife of Eckley, who are among our oldest settlers.

The beach north and south of here is literally covered with a film of oil, which came in from the ocean a few days ago, coming no doubt either from a leak of an oil burner or from some storm tossed vessel that used it to calm the seas. Maybe a gusher opened in the ocean bed not far away.

"Port Orford Jake," the last of Sixes Indians, died at his home on Euchre creek, where for some time he has been in poor health and a county charge, although he had a valuable allotment claim in that section. He was about 70 years of age, and was liked by all who knew him.

H. A. St. Earle and W. M. Dillenback, the government officials who went up to Big Bend, via Lobster creek and Iron Mountain, returned Saturday and left by Monday's stage. They say that the snow on the Iron Mountain divide was five feet deep. Will Coy of Corbin was their guide, and though they had some rough experience they stood it well.

A coyote drive, after the method of the rabbit drives of Eastern Oregon, has been planned for Williams valley, near Grants Pass, next week. Coyotes have become very numerous and are committing wholesale depredations in the pigpens and chicken houses of the farmers. The ranchers have decided upon extermination. All the boys and men of that part of the county will join in the drive, together with a number from this city. Captains, leaders and scouts have been chosen. A line will be formed and the coyotes routed from the brush and driven to the central rendezvous. No guns will be allowed. Clubs will be the only weapons, and dogs will assist in the drive.

Myrtle Point Notes

From the Enterprise.

Senator Fulton has introduced a resolution in congress calling for the use of the unexpended portion of a recent Coos bay appropriation in the dredging of the harbor. Several thousand dollars are in the fund.

James Stitt of Portland, representing a firm making machinery for condensed milk factories, was in Myrtle Point Tuesday, and in company with Mayor Stemmer, was calling on the people to ascertain if this place might desire to establish a condensed milk factory. He interviewed a number of dairymen as well as business men, and proposes

to return after a visit to Bandon and make a further canvass of the local field.

O. Dodge has received a copy of the late report regarding the improvements to navigation desired on the Coquille river, with maps of the river and the proposed betterments. The report contemplates and recommends the removal of rocks and shoals, and it is said that the work required can be accomplished for \$27,840, giving vessels a good channel to Coquille.

Rev. W. C. Rushing, until recently pastor of the Presbyterian church at this place, writes that he has temporary charge of a church of 400 members at Hanford, California.

The fact that the orchardists of Coos county are spraying, pruning and cleaning up generally speaks well for their enterprise. They have not waited for an inspector to come around and tell them that such must be done to their orchards, but have taken the bit between their teeth and gone ahead regardless. It is this spontaneous spirit of progress that speaks more for the advancement of Coos as a fruit country than the enforced and grudging improvement shown in other sections. The Coquille Valley Fruit Growers association has been a factor in this progress, and it may be worth while to remember that its next meeting date is Wednesday afternoon, March 4th, when officers are to be chosen.
