The arrival of F. J. Marshall from the east per steamer Elizabeth Monday inspired the people of Bandon with confidence that little longer delay will attend the beginning of construction of our new paper mill. He is the capitalist promoter of the venture and is here to settle the details preliminary to actual construction work. The paper and pulp mill is a certainty and its advent will signify one of the biggest enterprises of southern Oregon.

Mr. Marshall met with the directors of the concern Monday evening. He will remain another week and then return east to purchase the machinery. The directors will look after the erection of the buildings.

Oh, That Mail Service.

Our county exchanges are again lampooning the Roseburg-Myrtle Point mail contractor, and evidently with good cause, or at least we are not getting the semblance of a decent service, whatever may be the efforts and intents of the contractor.
