Notice of Street Improvement.

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Trustees of the Town of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, by order duly passed on the 19th day of February, 1908, which order is duly entered in the journal of the proceedings of the said Board for that day, does propose to improve a portion of Atwater street as follows: Beginning at the east line of intersection with Columbia avenue; to improve the said street by bridge work and planking extending from said beginning eastward for 700 feet more or less, to ground above tidewater, and in all respects similar to the work on the west end of Atwater street just completed.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that unless two-thirds of the property owners upon such street file a written remonstrance against such improvements with the Recorder of said Town, within Ten (10) days from the final publication of this notice, which notice will be upon Thursday, the 5th day of March, 1908, that an Ordinance will be passed by the said Board of Trustees establishing the grade upon the said street, and also appropriating funds for all of said work, by levying an assessment upon the adjacent and abutting lots or tracts of land in proportion to the frontage thereof upon said street, which Ordinance will further provide for the collection of such assessments, in accordance with law.

Further provided that the Town will not pay for any planking or other part of the said improvement.
