BANDON MOVES ON.

Again is the fact made manifest that the people of Bandon are actors, not talkers. Again is it proven that her policy of expansion, long ago proclaimed, was sincere and made with the object of building such a city at the Coquille's mouth as resources and capital would permit. Is there any longer doubt that the excellent resources of Southern Coos county are coming to be utilized, and where they should be, through the wide awake and earnest spirit of the business men hereabout?

The RECORDER congratulates the people of Bandon and vicinity upon the success of their efforts to secure a paper and pulp mill, an industry so promising here, and one that is certain to bring fame and pecuniary return. It marks one more and very important step in the rapid and genuine growth of Bandon and Southern Coos county.

Now give us a little better river and bar—not a forty-foot bar exactly; twenty feet minimum depth would make us leap with ecstasy and joy!

AND now comes the announcement that C. A. Smith, owner of the magnificent new mill near Marshfield, having early wearied of the extortionate practices of the Coos Bay-Myrtle Point railroad, intends building a railroad of his own from Randolph, above Prosper, to Isthmus Slough for the transportation of his great supply of logs. It is even said that Mr. Smith expresses regret because he failed to build his mill on the Coquille river in the first place. His logs, to be sure, must come from this side.

PROFESSOR R. S. TARR, occupying the chair of physical geography at Cornell university, is the author of a geography now used as a text book in a vast number of schools throughout the United States, and in revising this book is paying especial attention to the development of Oregon and Washington. The Portland Commercial Club has furnished Professor Tarr very complete data on Oregon, together with a number of thoroughly representative pictures, and genuine interest by the author is shown from a request for further photographs of specific subjects. Washington's commercial bodies will see that the "Evergreen State" is properly taken care of.

TWO YEARS in the Multnomah county jail and a fine of \$7,500 is the penalty to be paid by Horace G. McKinley, the land fraud operator, who was brought back from Manchuria to receive sentence. When will the courts acquire the habit of giving long imprisonment without due to these rich land pillagers?

Captain C. P. Jensen, present master of the steamer Bandon running to this port, informs the Recorder that he will accept the command of the steamer Fiefield when that vessel is completed and ready for the San Francisco Bandon run. Captain Jensen's present first mate, Mr. Bash, will succeed him on the bridge of the Bandon. The Fiefield is being built at North Bend for the Estabrook Co., owners of the Bandon, and will be launched about the first of May, being ready for actual service within two months thereafter. She will engage in carrying lumber from our several mills and will be fitted with accommodations for twenty-four passengers.

The steamers Elizabeth and Bandon have both escaped the engineers strike so far by reason of their owners having no membership in the steam schooners association. According to a San Francisco paper the Kruse, the Estabrook and the Caspar companies, the first two, respectively, the owners of the Elizabeth and Bandon, are about the only firms whose boats are not tied up good and fast at San Francisco. So there is no cause for grumbling, to date at least, by the shippers of the Coquille. Bandon is always on top!

Ed Haaland, a laborer well known about town, met with a distressing accident Friday afternoon. He was helping to unload telephone poles on the wharf near the Commercial company's warehouse when the pile rolled down upon him, breaking both his legs in a shocking manner. The unfortunate man was given medical aid as quickly as possible and on the day following was sent to the county hospital at Coquille. He is a young man of strong physique and may survive his injuries without the loss of either limb, but it will be a long time before he can again work. He belongs to the local longshoremen's union.

Constable Rube Gardner had an exciting but successful chase last week in his pursuit of Wyatt, the colored restaurant keeper, who left so hastily without kissing importunate creditors goodbye. Rube struck the scent in the direction of Curry county, and might have nabbed his man sooner but for it being the dark of the moon. Wyatt was captured beyond Port Orford. He was brought back to Bandon and judgment rendered against him for the amount claimed by plaintiff and all costs. Upon payment of all he had, some \$30, he was allowed to go his way rejoicing.

The new tug which is to be built for replacing the Triumph in service on the lower Coquille and bar will be built at either the Price or Heuckendorff shipyards. Local business men are subscribing liberally for stock in the boat, but whatever is not locally taken will be subscribed for by the Doe Estate, owners of the Triumph. So it is apparent that a new and up-to-date tug boat suited to this bar is assured. The Doe Estate, of which J. L. Kronenberg is manager, will sell the Triumph to San Francisco parties, it is said.

T. B. Wheeler, Edgar Wheeler and Ed Oakes was among the arrivals from the bay Friday. Mr. Oakes brought over a specimen booklet issued by the Marshfield chamber of commerce, wherein Bandon is given credit of being a "thriving little town of 1400 people with a sawmill and shipyard." We appreciate these little boosts, but would prefer a more optimistic estimate of a population that we place, conservatively, at 2500.

Each week brings a new candidate to the surface down in wide awake Curry. From appearances every bewhiskered resident of that county is going to be an aspirant for office this spring, and the women must grapple with the farm work until after the ballots are counted. But then it is leap year, anyway.
