The Coos Bay Times has just discovered that the city of Bandon will be unable to have the tax collector collect its taxes for 1908, through a neglect of our municipal authorities to notify the county clerk at the proper time. The RECORDER concedes there was an oversight, but it has been known for some months in this section. However, Bandon will not suffer materially by the error, as we have no bonded indebtedness now existing, simply owing for a fire engine and a few outstanding municipal warrants, whereas there will be \$2,000 or \$2,500 of license money to be paid in shortly. No, we can meet the situation without any perceptible hardship, Bro. Times.

EDITOR GUS BENNETT of the Coos Bay News has kept a close watch on the shipping and matters generally of Coos Bay for a hundred years, more or less, and he takes the RECORDER to task last week for asking if any vessel running to the bay has ever beaten the recent record trip of the steamer Elizabeth to this port. Mr. Hume to Colonize Curry

R. D. Hume, whose winter home is at Piedmont, Cal., was in Salem last week and told a reporter that he had made all his plans to give away large holdings of lands on a new plan that will bring many settlers to Curry county. He proposes to cut up the larger part of 15,000 acres into 20-acre tracts and give each family locating on one of them a cow, a pig and some chickens, and then let them have the land rent free for five years. The other 15 years he will ask them to pay \$2 per acre rent and the taxes, and at the end of that time they will get a deed to the property. Besides they will have free timber and the use of a sawmill to cut all the lumber needed for improvements. The experiment will be tried first with 20 families. If that succeeds he will locate 20 more families. He intends to make Curry county the ideal home place for thrifty, industrious families.

The Rowan brothers of North Bend, deaf and dumb followers of the ring, gave an exhibition contest in the opera house Saturday night to a fair sized audience. Club swinging and bag punching by Silent Rowan, two rounds between him and Frank Blackerby and a 4-round finale between the brothers themselves made up the evening's program.
