## Oregon University and the Referendum.

It is a deplorable state of affairs that such an advancement in ideas, as the Referendum and its adoption would seem to indicate, existing among the people of the great state of Oregon, should be accompanied by the spirit of retrogression, shown by those who would cut off the support of our leading institution of learning; it as a powerful instrument of popular government, defeats its own ends when applied to such a use, and in the hands of the ignorant few who seek to curtail education in this state, it is injuring the great cause of free learning. Our state Universities, since Michigan first paved the way by her great example, are and must be the greatest and most powerful leaders in impartial truth and learning, unbiased by any allegiance or indebtedness to any power except the power and finance of the people themselves. In Michigan, Wisconsin, California and other states where in are state Universities ranking equal and superior to the endowed schools of plutocracy, if their people had displayed the spirit shown by a few of our Oregon citizens, the youth of this country would now have no alternative but to attend such schools as are endowed by and under the control of individual rich men; by the maintenance of State institutions our educations are paid for by the people and we owe nothing to Carnegie or to Rockefeller unless we desire of our own free will, to partake of the learning paid for by them. It is to be hoped that the people of this state will demonstrate to the world that the ideas of our majority are sound in the use of this law as well as in the mere making thereof, and that they will sustain the appropriation for our University.

A PROMINENT business man, representing large interests in San Francisco, recently made the assertion that the greatest need of this community is transportation. We know it. We have almost everything the world needs but we cannot ship it. Many of our products should go North but we cannot ship except via the bay with many changes, making the rates excessive beyond profit. The advantages of a commerce with this port have been seen by San Francisco and San Pedro, and we have some thirteen or fourteen sailing vessels running south from here, besides two modern oil burning steamers on schedule between Bandon and San Francisco; also two new steamers being built for the same run. Portland, the metropolis of Oregon, however, has neglected us for some reason, or lack of reason, unknown to us; our business men have repeatedly tried to get a line from Portland to Bandon, they have communicated with the commercial organizations of the former city to no avail. A recent communication to the Commercial club of Portland asking them to interview the management of a concern about to establish a new coasting line, and to suggest and urge making Bandon and the Coquille, a port of call, was answered by a letter to the effect that we should "take the matter up with the San Francisco dealers as their influence would be a more potent factor" than any in Portland. Wake up Portland to your great opportunity for commercial development in this region, or you will never share the trade that San Francisco is now monopolizing.

At this time, when the fruit growers of Coos county are being brought to a scientific compliance with the laws of the state in the matter of the care of their orchards, under the superintendence of Inspector Pohl, anything bearing upon the matter

should be of great interest to the community. We desire to call your attention to the articles of this nature which will be published by the RECORDER from time to time, and especially to the able treatment given the subject of "Lime-Sulphur Spray as a Preventive of Apple Scab" by A. B. Cordray, in this issue.

THE Coos Bay Times, editorially, asserts that under the direct primary, with Statement No. 1, men like Guggenheimer, Clark or Elkins could not be elected, in other words, that Statement No. 1 knocks out the long purse in politics. However, they do not mention Senator Bourne whose millions elected him under Statement No. 1.

THE press of the county have been saying all kinds of nice things about the Bandon Concert Band and the Fair management on the Bay have invited them to furnish the music for the coming District Fair. Thank you, everybody, for we are proud of "Our Band" all right.
