



Candidates in Tomorrow's Primary Election

BANDON MAN FOR SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

ROBERT GOETZ, A NATIVE SON OF OREGON, ISSUES A SIGNED STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLES AND POLICIES IF ELECTED.

In the contest now on for the republican nomination for school superintendent, indications seem to point to Robert Goetz, as the probable nominee. He has made a clean and vigorous campaign for the nomination, has a clear record as a republican, is a man of good education and fine character, and over and above all else, has presented to the consideration of the voters of the county, a signed statement containing his principles and policies in the conduct of the office, should he be nominated and elected. This statement commends itself in its succinct outline and is as follows: If nominated and elected school superintendent, I will move to the county seat, and be in my office every day, except Sunday or when visiting scholars. I will work to secure in every town in the county a four year standard high school with a good department in manual training. Believing that the best results can be secured by association with others I will hold local institutes in every town in the county, and I will endeavor to organize and maintain local teacher's study clubs. To encourage and better the work of the district schools, and to arouse a greater interest among patrons, teachers and pupils in their school work and home life. I will follow the example of other superintendents and hold an annual school fair for the schools of Coos county. Sincerely believing in the future greatness of Coos county, it will be my earnest effort to make the schools of the county, what the schools of a great county should be. I stand for honesty, efficiency and progress in school supervision.

Honesty in the sense of fair dealing to all and the faithful performance of the duties of my office, and efficiency and progress in school work and school supervision. In the forthcoming republican primaries, I respectfully ask the support of all who believe in the policies I have here outlined or who are interested in good schools. Respectfully yours, ROBERT GOETZ. Mr. Goetz is a graduate of the normal department of Philomath College and has since that time completed a two year's course in the study of law. He has spent the last six years in active teaching, during which time he has successfully handled primary, grammar and full high school courses. Until within the past four years, he has been a resident of Bandon, where his mother and brother, well known Bandonians, still reside. His present residence is at Gravel Ford, where he has resided since his marriage four years ago, to the daughter of D. R. Lewis. Mr. Goetz was born at Coquille in 1881 and has spent most of his life in the county. He is a prominent figure in fraternal affairs, and has the support of a host of friends. The following statement from a prominent member of the party from Coos Bay, in discussing the candidacy and qualifications of Mr. Goetz, in a recent conversation, presents the ideas of many on the question. "Being a native of Coos county, having made his own way in the world, ever striving to improve the public schools, and having always been a consistent republican, he should receive the hearty support of every member of the party."

Some Pertinent Remarks on H. M. Cake's Candidacy.

In spite of the desperate efforts of the old machine and representatives of certain big trusts to accomplish his defeat, the nomination of H. M. Cake, champion of statement no. 1, for United States Senator on April 17, is generally conceded throughout the state. It is predicted in Portland that he will carry Multnomah county by between 500 and 6000. With few exceptions, the newspapers of the state have rallied loyally to Mr. Cake's support. In urging his nomination, the Polk county Observer says: "Hon. H. M. Cake is making a magnificent campaign and his nomination, never seriously in doubt, is now practically assured by a rousing majority. Enthusiastic crowds have flocked to hear him in his trip through southern Oregon, and his tour of eastern Oregon, where he has always been strong with the voters, promises to be in the nature of a triumphal march. Mr. Cake is making a clean, dignified campaign, free from personality or abuse and is earnestly advocating the principles he believes to be right. He is an able, effective speaker who makes no attempt at high-flown oratory, but takes the people into his confidence and has a quiet heart-to-heart talk with them on the important issues now before the people of the state and nation—the most effective oratory by the way, can be indulged in by any public speaker in this practical age. He dodges no issues, straddles no question, but frankly discusses every subject in a manner that leaves no doubt in any mind as to his sincerity. In Mr. Cake the people feel they have a man whom they can trust; one who would represent them honorably and fearlessly in the Nation's highest law-making body."

Myrtle Point Elects City Officials.

The Myrtle Point city election passed off very quietly at the city hall last Monday, only 118 votes being cast. There was no lively contest on and as a consequence many who had a right to vote failed to appear and register a preference. W. O. Cooper and J. L. Lewellen, having declined to run for the office of councilmen, there was but two names on the ticket, and with the exception of a few scattering votes they captured the electors. R. C. Dement received 112 votes and J. D. Barklow 99, both being elected for a three year term to succeed W. Williams and E. A. Dodge, whose terms have expired. I. E. Rose was re-elected recorder for a one-year term by a vote of 73. He was opposed by V. L. Arrington who polled 43 votes. J. M. Arrington was re-elected city treasurer by a vote of 99 against 16 for E. W. Hermann.—Enterprise.

Coos County Oil Fields.

Extensive oil fields will soon be opened up in the Coos Bay country. Forty tons of boring machinery will leave for that section on the steamer Alliance, which is scheduled to sail tomorrow night. The fields have been thoroughly prospected and it is said that every indication goes to show that they will turn out to be even richer in production than those of California. On the strength of a lengthy report recently made by experts, the owner of about 2000 acres of ground decided to develop the property at once. The machinery is consigned to A. Crittenden of Marshfield.

Coal deposits have been uncovered on the property. Tributary to them oil can be seen gushing from the ground in various localities. Tests show the product is of high grade as any fuel oil on the Pacific Coast. It pours out of the ground so freely in places that scums of it form on the bay. Until in the last two or three months it was a mystery as to where the oil came from. Steps are being taken to organize a stock company for prospecting and making locations.—Portland Telegram.

BANDON'S NEW CREAMERY OPENS

Begins Operation This Week Under Most Favorable Conditions.

IT WILL ADD TO BANDON'S PROSPERITY

Bandon's new creamery has commenced operations, and will begin, under contract, to handle the great quantities of milk and cream produced in this vicinity, to-morrow. This institution, which has the Golden State Creamery Co. of San Francisco at its back, is being managed by C. Nelson and J. R. Green, both of the Golden State Company. Mr. Green, who is well known in Bandon has been with them four years. These gentlemen have equipped their new 40x60, two storied building, (in addition to which are storage and engine houses) with the most modern machinery and arrangements with special regard to scientific sanitation, and have engaged Mr. R. M. Pressy, one of the most highly recommended butter makers of the middle west, to manufacture their butter. None but fancy grades will be turned out, as the firm desire to make a reputation synonymous with quality. Their apparatus includes a simple churn with a capacity of 1000 pounds per churning, and a peerless ripener, a full cold storage plant with the brine system of refrigeration with a circulating pump, ensuring absolute control of temperature at all times. Cream is taken direct from wagons to the tanks on an elevated platform, and from boats by a complete elevator system in connection with a floating dock, eliminating any possibility of churning in handling. The cream is pumped but once in this model establishment, ensuring sanitary condition of the product. Messrs. Green, Nelson and Pressy are public spirited men, and will do

all in their power to advance the interests of Coos and Curry dairying industry. They have all apparatus and full equipment for testing and for making lactic acid cultures, and will do these services for dairymen, free of charge. In this way, they seek to bring dairying up to a scientific basis here. Mr. Green states that the Coquille valley and adjacent territory is a second Humboldt; the conditions here being very similar to those at Eureka, and he thinks that five years will make the California county look to her laurels if she would keep Coos in the second place in the dairy records of the world. "The best in the land, and Bandon its logical manufacturing and shipping center," are his words in discussing the grand project.
