ALL authorities on Oregon politics are agreed that the deepening of the Coquille river is a vital necessity in the platform of any candidate.

TILLAMOOK will have a new boat between that port and Portland, says the Herald. The acquisition of a new line direct to the metropolis was the result of unanimous co-operation on the part of the merchants of Tillamook with the management of the S. S. company. We are glad to see our neighboring city get the line; we hope and expect to get one ours lives down here on the Coquille. There will be no trouble to get co-operation to make the line a success, as enough traffic is waiting to assure a splendid profit from the start.

Local Option Enjoined.

Two proceedings have been commenced in the Circuit Court during the past week to test the legality of the proposed sub-division election under the local option election laws. The first is a writ of review asking to have the order of election made by the county court on the 8th inst. set aside; and the second is a suit in equity to enjoin the county clerk from putting the prohibition question on ticket.—Sentinel.

Coquille, April 23, [Special]—Judge Hamilton of the circuit court has granted the application of E. A. Beckett, a Coquille liquor dealer, for a writ of review of the petitions to have the prohibition question submitted to the voters of Coos county at the June election. The granting of the writ practically means that the election cannot be held June 1st, so that the local option campaign of the prohibitionists will be delayed indefinitely. It is likely that the county clerk will be enjoined from putting the question on the ballots for the election June 1st.

The action came, as a surprise to the leaders of the prohibition movement in Coquille, they, through the recently former Coos County Anti-saloon League, have done considerable work in its behalf. Judge Hall of the county court, recently ordered the question submitted at the general election June 1st. The vote was to have been on the county as a whole and also for county composed of Burton Prairie, East Coquille, West Coquille, Dora, Enchanted Prairie, Lee, Myrtle Point, Missouri, Deer Park, Norway, Riverton, Parkersburg, and Rosland Prairie.

Railroad Rumors

Many rumors are afloat in regard to railroad development in the coast section of Oregon.

Late newspaper reports state that the Drain branch will be pushed to a quick finish. Already men are in the field, and contracts have been let for grading and tunneling as far as Coos Bay. That the S. P. and their allies mean business, can no longer be doubted.

Other reports are to the effect that the new electric line from Portland to Salem is being extended to Eugene and that it will be continued to Roseburg and thence to either Coos Bay or Bandon, or both ports. It is also surmised by authorities in such affairs, that the Hill interests are back of the electric line, and that they will rush work through via Roseburg, to head off the entrance of Harriman form Drain, and to be first in getting established on one, or both of the harbors of southwestern Oregon.

It is thought by some that the newly organized Coquille Valley Power Company will build and operate the line to Roseburg, and that their power which can be greatly increased will be utilized all along the connecting lines.

Students of conditions, think that the building of a railroad through this region, within a short time, is an inevitable event. It is the water level route between the Columbia river and San Francisco, whether it comes up the Willamette and through the passes, or down the Columbia, via Astoria. Lines of railroads are already being built along the coast south from Astoria, south from Coos Bay and both north and south from Eureka, and it is quite feasible that these lines should be extended and connected to make one trunk line, avoiding all the heavy grades now encountered on the Southern Pacific between Portland and San Francisco.

Options on several valuable terminal sites in and near Bandon are held by different parties, presumed to be representing railroad companies, and what purports to be the final survey of the Southern Pacific, has been made as far as Gold Beach, passing through Bandon from Drain. This is only one of several surveys that have been made, but it is the last one and has been made with great care, and is generally, on good authority, believed to be the course of a real railroad to come as soon as possible under existing conditions, to develop the greatest area of great natural wealth remaining in the United States, as yet without the service of rails and steam for transportation.

New Postoffice Ruling

New rulings by the postoffice department at Washington make it necessary that subscribers to newspapers shall keep their subscriptions paid to a time prescribed. In the case of weekly papers all subscriptions must be fully paid up to within one year. The penalty for sending papers to delinquents is the forfeiture of the right to second class rates of postage. Violation of the rule in one instance may forfeit a newspaper's rights for the whole subscription list. Many subscriptions to the Recorder become in arrears beyond the time prescribed next week and the paper will be stopped at that time in accordance with the law.
