



LAUNCHING OF THE STEAMER DAISY AT PRICE'S SHIPYARD OCCURRED TODAY

A Most Notable Event in the History of Bandon and the Coquille Region Was Celebrated by the Entire Town and Many Visitors.

MANY SIMILAR EVENTS WILL BE OBSERVED BY US IN NOT DISTANT FUTURE

The ceremonies incident to the launching of the new steamer Daisy, at Price's shipyard in Bandon, is under progress today and a general holiday has been declared in honor of the event.

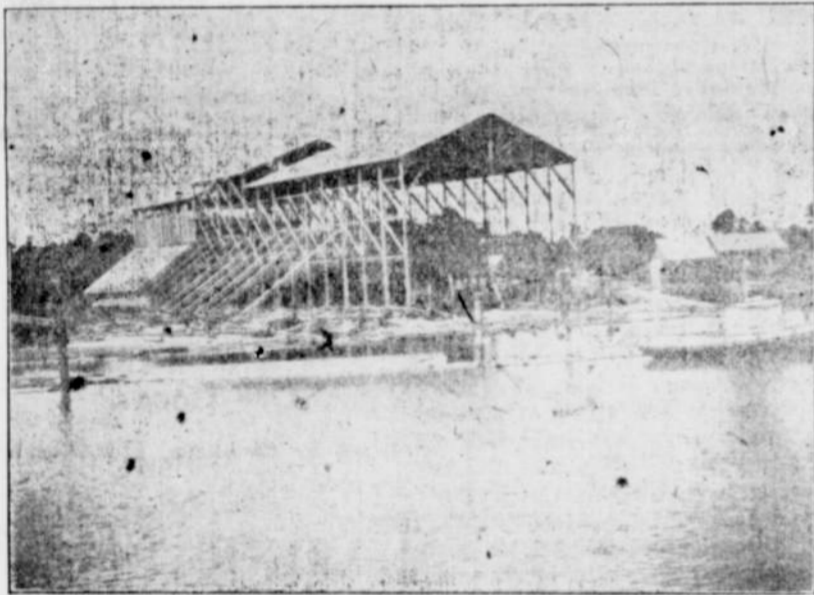
At 12 o'clock, noon, the ship will be allowed to glide into the river. Miss Erma Craine will christen the boat and break a bottle of wine over the side.

The schools will be closed and the children be allowed to enjoy the day as well as older people. Many residents of Coquille and other up-river points came in last evening to view the launching and enjoy the other festivities of the day.

The following brief outline of Mr. Price's career and the history of his shipyard here is well worth perusing:

J. H. Price was connected with the Bendixon Shipbuilding company of Eureka, and then went into business for himself in San Francisco, where he conducted a general repair business for vessels of all kinds.

The Bandon plant was located on the north side of the river just above Bandon. It was an ideal place for such an industry, and work progressed rapidly, the mills supplying him with lumber without any unnecessary delay.

The day is a momentous one for our city and marks a new era in its industrial development. Shipbuilding is destined to vast importance on the Coquille, and Bandon will now display its appreciation of the gentleman who has established the industry here in a permanent and enduring manner.

Since rebuilding his shipyard Mr. Price has employed a large number of men and has pushed work on the two boats he is now building with all possible speed. The Daisy is the first completed, and is 205 feet long, over all, the largest boat to be launched on the Coquille river, and we have launched quite a number.

While the origin of the fire was unknown, every precaution having been taken to prevent any conflagration, but the flames had obtained such a headway, that control was out of the question, and the fine new plant burned to the ground, a total loss, which aggregated the approximate sum of \$110,000.

As soon as insurance matters had been settled satisfactorily, work commenced on the new yard, located right in Bandon. The new site was far superior to the old one and the proximity to the Gody Mill, which makes a speciality of ship timbers, and better fire protection, gave it prestige over rebuilding at the old place.

Proceedings of Republican County Committee.

The Republican County Central Committee of Coos county met at Coquille, Monday, April 27, 1908. Present: A. H. Derbyshire of North Bend, J. S. Barton of East Coquille, B. H. Burns of West Coquille, F. K. Gettins of South Marshfield, J. W. Clinton of Norway, C. A. Schelbrede of South Slough, George A. Gould of Aldegany, by this proxy E. Mingus of Marshfield.

The meeting was called to order by P. L. Phelan of Myrtle Point, Chairman of the old committee, whereupon the committee was organized by the election of P. L. Phelan, as Chairman, and A. H. Derbyshire of North Bend as Secretary.

On motion duly seconded and carried E. Mingus was elected to represent North Marshfield at this meeting, and in case the committee elect from that precinct fails to qualify, to serve as committeeman from North Marshfield.

The chairman of the committee stated that he had been informed by the State Central Committee that Coos county was only entitled to six delegates to the State and Congressional District Conventions, instead of the ten elected at the County Convention.

A motion was then made, seconded and carried that the committee elect one delegate at large from the county and one from each district, as created by the last county convention. Whereupon the following were duly elected as delegates to the State and Congressional District conventions, which meet at Portland, Oregon, May 14, 1908:

C. A. Selbrede, Delegate at large. Peter Loggie District No. 1. E. A. Anderson, District No. 2. R. H. Rosa, District No. 3. C. R. Barrow, District No. 4. J. W. Clinton, District No. 5.

On motion duly seconded and carried C. A. Selbrede was elected state central committeeman.

On motion duly seconded and carried J. S. Barton was elected congressional district committeeman. On motion duly seconded and carried it was ordered that the chairman fill all vacancies now existing or which shall hereafter exist in the offices of precinct committeeman.

On motion duly seconded and carried T. J. Lewis was nominated as the republican candidate for coroner of Coos county, and his name ordered placed upon the official ballot.

On motion duly seconded it was ordered that the precinct committeeman from North Bend, South Marshfield and North Marshfield, with P. L. Phelan, Chairman, be and are constituted an executive committee to take charge of the campaign preceding the June election; and to transact any other business of the committee which shall become necessary before the June election.

On motion duly seconded and carried it was ordered that the Secretary notify those chosen for delegates to the State Convention, that they were so chosen, and notify those who were elected at the county convention, but not chosen by the committee, of the change in delegates made necessary by the new apportionment for Coos county. Duly made and seconded the committee adjourned.

Coquille Objects to Bandon.

Managers Howard and Whisnant, of the Marshfield and North Bend base ball teams, will go to Coquille Sunday to meet the managers of Bandon and Coquille at that city in conference to reorganize the Coos County League, which afforded the patrons of the game great base ball last season.

Several important topics will come under discussion, the main one being the schedule for the season. This may be adopted as it was last year, a very satisfactory one having been arranged at that time.

Myrtle Point will probably make application to enter the circuit, and it a possible five-game schedule can be arranged the proposition may receive consideration.

Coquille objects to Bandon and wants Myrtle Point, on the grounds that Marshfield and North Bend are too far from Bandon and Bandon too far from Marshfield and North Bend to make these games desirable. This is real kind of Coquille to look out for the welfare of the extremes, but it is feared she will be forced to play the prospective snappy team from the city by the sea just the same.

It is likely a date of closing entries to the team will be fixed, with the privilege of adding a player every thirty days, if desired. This will make the teams semi-professional, something the public demands.

At present North Bend shows up strongest, she having defeated the Marshfield team three times in succession. She has perfected her organization, while Marshfield seems to be considering the matter, a base ball meeting called a few days ago having had but a few players present.—Coos Bay Harbor.

Statement 1 Has Majority

A majority of the Republican candidates nominated for the Oregon Legislature last Friday ran on anti-statement No. 1 platforms; but because of nine or ten hold-over Senators, the statement forces will control the State Senate by election of the new republican nominees for that body. In the House, the Statement forces will lack six of a majority should they elect all their republican nominees.

In joint assembly they will lack three of a majority, should Senator Kay, who is conditionally pledged to the June election choice for United States Senator, act with the Statement forces. If he should refuse to vote for a democratic United States senator, in case he won in June, the Statement men would lack four of a majority.
