

court today the action of the Multnomah court was not only reversed, but remanded, the justice declaring that when the locks were bought by the state, the people had a right not only to the \$200,000 originally paid them, but also to per cent of all the profits that have accrued since the first company began doing business at Oregon City.

In the case of the state of Oregon versus Christ Neilsen, the decision of the Clatsop county circuit court was sustained. Neilsen, who is a resident of the state of Washington, was tried and convicted by the state of Oregon for fishing on the Washington side of the Columbia river with a purse net. By the laws of Washington, in force at the time of his arrest, Neilsen was guilty of no offense, but by the laws of Ore on this kind of fishing on the Columbia was contrary to the statute.

The single question for decision, therefore, was whether the law of Oregon prohibiting the catching of fish in the manner indicated extended over the entire waters of the Columbia, or only over those on the Oregon side. By act of congress on March 2, 1895, Oregon and Washington have concurrent jurisdiction over all offenses committed on the Columbia.

As far as the state of Washington is concerned, Neilsen's act is not an offense, but under the law of this state it is. The court has decided that Oregon has jurisdiction in this case, and that Neilsen's fishing was an offense against the law of this state. The case will probably be appealed to the United States supreme court.

Following is the official weather and crop report as sent out by the Oregon section of the Climatological Service:

"The fore part of the week was generally clear. During this period the temperature throughout the day was unseasonably high, especially over the eastern counties, though the temperature at night did not vary much from the normal. On Thursday, however, there was a decided change to cloudy and unseasonably cool weather, which continued for the remainder of the week. Frequently light showers occurred during this latter period, accompanied in many localities by hail and high winds. Light to heavy frosts occurred over the entire state on Tuesday and Saturday mornings, and a killing frost in southern Oregon on Sunday morning. There was a marked deficiency in the sunshine for the week."
