## Election Results.

The returns from the election over the county and state are very slow in materializing. In conversation with County Clerk James Watson, over the phone this morning the RECORDER was informed there could be no definite returns given for a day or two yet, but that the county was conceded to be wet by about forty or fifty majority.

The men elected to the various offices in the county are as follows, clerk, Watson, Rep. sheriff, Gage, Dem; treasurer, Dullely, Rep; assessor, Thrift; Dem. superintendent of schools, Buuch, Rep. surveyor, Gould, Rep. commissioner, Dement Rep; coroner, Lewis Rep; state senator, Chase, Rep. representative fifth district, Bedillion, Dem. representative sixth district, Muncy, Rep.

In the contest for United States senator, Mr. Cake has a majority of about 200 in Coos county, but it may require the official count to tell who has won out in the state.

Mr. Hawley is undoubtedly elected to congress from the first district by a safe majority, and the entire republican state ticket is probably elected.

## Weather and Crop Bulletin

Following is the general weather and crop bulletin for the past week as sent out by the Climatological service at Portland:

The week was generally cloudy and unseasonably cool. A short spell of fair weather prevailed on Friday and Saturday, during which the temperature rapidly rose. On Sunday morning, however, cool and showery weather again set in, which continued until the close of the week. The rainfall was about equally distributed over the entire section, but the showers were more frequent over the northwestern counties. Light frosts occurred in southern Oregon on Wednesday morning, and in the eastern counties on Saturday and Monday mornings.
